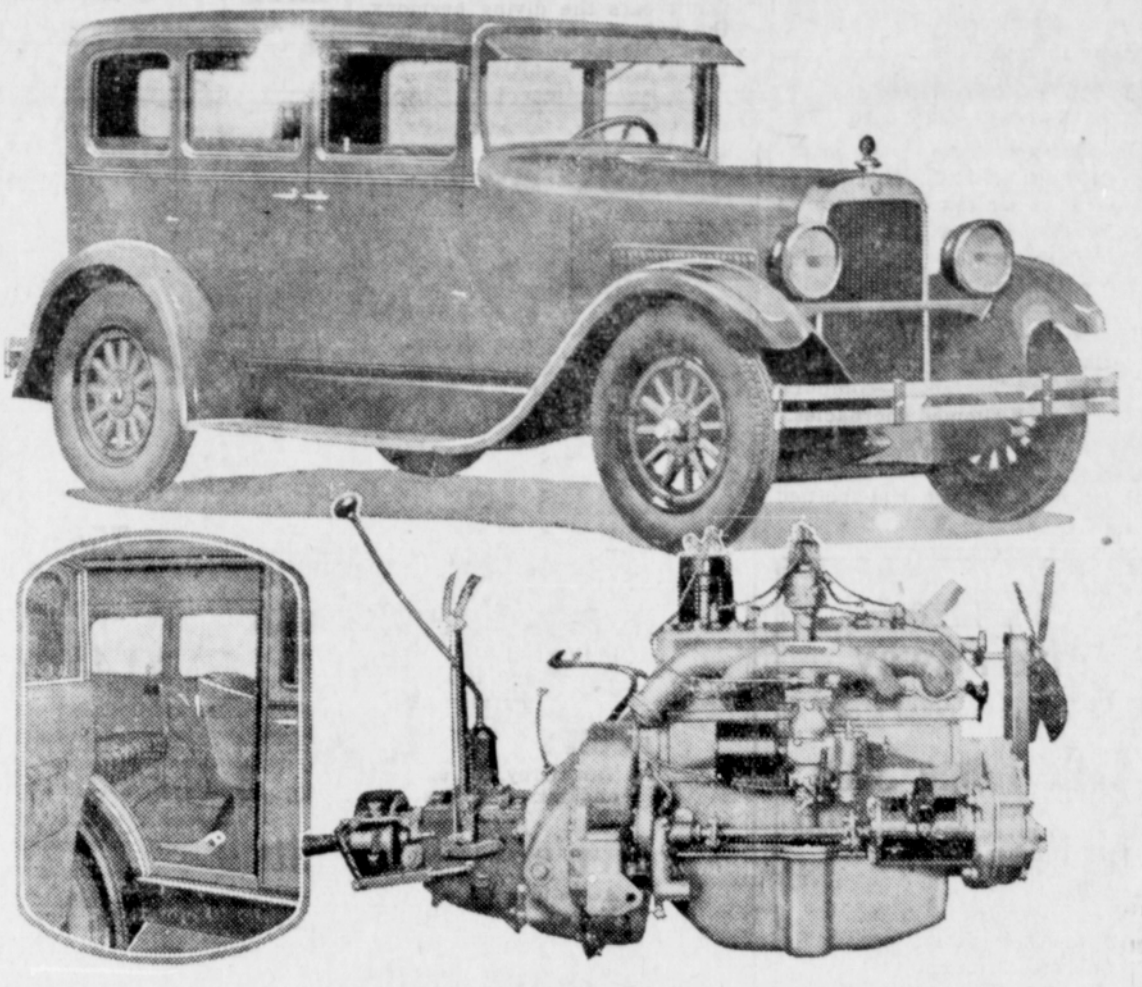


Dodge Introduces America's Fastest Fours

These new cars are said to be capable of going 25 or more miles on a gallon of gasoline at average touring speed, and will be priced at levels materially below those at which Dodge Brothers cars of corresponding types have always sold. A coupe and cabriolet roadster will be available shortly.
