Mrs. W. F. Honey and her guests, Mr. and Mrs. Hans Neate, who have been spending the past two weeks at Vancouver, Victoria, and other

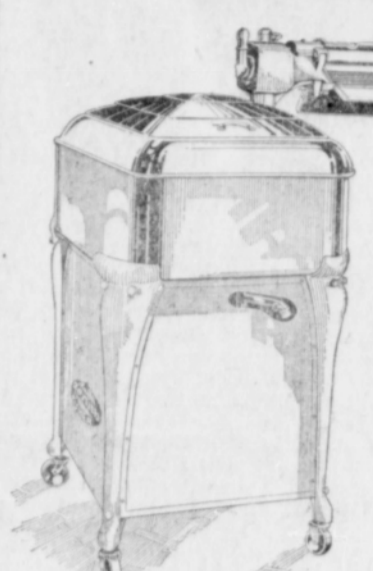
