NESTUCCA FISH BILL NOT WELL RECEIVED

The 1927 legislature did some foolish and unnecessary things and among them it juggled some fish problems making them political footballs. The Nestucca Bay fish bill, like some others was loaded with political dynamite and merit had practically nothing to do with its passage.

The Oregon State Sportsmen's association, devoted to the game interests, wants the Nestucca closed to commercial fishing and hence favors the bill passed by the last legislature and referred to the people. The voters of the state can approve the law or kill it.

It should be taken into consideration that only the so-called sportsmen want to close the Nestucca to net fishing. The people who live there and engage in fishing and a small salmon cannery want the privilege of carrying on their business and harming no one. Tillamook county doesn't want this law and why should the rest of the state foist it upon them? No interest of the fishing industry nor any real worthy purpose of the sportsman is now endangered without the law, or would be promoted by the enactment and enforcement of this law. EXPLAINS VIEWS ON COUNTY-CITY MEASURE

City and county consolidation, as I view it, would mean one of the three following things:

- 1. Consolidation of the city and county under one head would deprive the balance of the county of any county government thereby compelling the rural district of the county to apply for annexation in order to secure administration; or
2. The remaining part of the county would be divided between Washington, Clackamas or Hood River counties for administration; or
3. The balance of the county would be compelled to set up its own county government which would entail the creation of a county by courthouse, the creation of a sheriff's office, clerk's office, and the other various departments of the county government, including the maintenance of all our roads and, in addition, if this plan or that of paragraph number 2 above were followed, it would become necessary to transfer all deed records of the territory affected at a tremendous expense.

It is reliably estimated that consolidation will make necessary the erection of a new large building of sufficient size to care for all departments at an estimated expense of from three (3) to five (5) million dollars, since neither the present county courthouse or the present city hall are large enough to care for the consolidated departments.

Contrary to the statements of the proponents of this scheme there are very few departments that could be consolidated, and in the case of those consolidated there would be no saving of clerical help although it might be possible to dispense with a few of the heads of departments. The proponents of this bill have consistently evaded or conveniently dodged making a statement of just what departments they expected to consolidate, how many less employees they expected to be able to handle the work with, or how much they expected to save. Their argument as set forth in the voter's pamphlet bears the ear-marks of long range shooting with a sawed-off shotgun.

As I stated in a previous article on this subject, the entire plan seems to be a deliberate attempt to bankrupt the farmers of Multnomah county in order to further the interests of certain designing interests or individuals in the city of Portland, one official in particular having focused his attention on securing (if such a position can be created) the highly lucrative job of city manager.

Mr. Montague in his recent article in the Oregonian ridicules the idea that the consolidation scheme will increase taxes, yet he offers no security to the farmers that their taxes will not be very substantially increased. A calm, careful analysis of the situation will convince anyone that if the rural districts are annexed to the city of Portland then this property must at once become subject to the existing bonded debt of the city; the farm lands will at once take on a "city" rather than a "farm" value and as such will not be attractive to the farm investors and the net result must of necessity be a marked increase in taxes. If the rural districts decline to annex to the city of Portland then it will be necessary, through appropriate legislative action, either to create a new county or divide the remainder of the county between adjoining counties and in either of these cases it will only add a grievous tax burden to the tax-ridden farmer who, in the eyes of political schemers, "is just a human football to be kicked at will, and wherever fancy dictates."

It would be interesting if the real instigators of the plan, those who stand behind the curtain and pull the strings, would step out in the spotlight and subject themselves to a searching inquiry, rather than hide behind a smoke screen called the 'Government Simplification Commission'.

History records that the embattled farmers of this country have protected their interests in the past, even to the point of taking drastic action when required, and it is to be hoped they will not be so neglectful of their interests as to fail to vote 313 X NO on June 28.
