AGED ROCKWOOD RESIDENT PASSES

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at the chapel of the Gates Funeral home for the late James S. Conrad of Rockwood who died on Friday, June 17, of apoplexy at the age of 81 years and 8 months. The aged man had attended the rose festival the previous day and, not being able to get a stage when he desired, walked from Linnemann junction to his home in Rockwood. It is believed that over exertion at that time was responsible for his demise.

He was never married and for 30 years past had lived with a pal, Dan J. Walsh. For 21 years they had resided together at Rockwood in the same location. He was congenial and well thought of, a man who loved to read, of quiet tastes and refinement. The deceased has a sister in Pennsylvania, Miss Lois G. Conrad. Out of regard to his old friend with whom he had lived so many years, he bequeathed him his entire estate amounting to around \$8,000.
