would be worse for the state than not to adopt it at all. There is too strong and divergent opinion on the practicability of an income tax to insure its permanency if adopted. It is believed to be an unwise experiment unless other states adopt a similar law. Oregon is hardly strong enough to stand alone in this method of double taxation, situated as she is between two much stronger states which are free from this tax and disrupting agitation.

329-331. Assessment and Taxation Enforcement Bill.

The only argument on this bill is a negative one, and this statement is made: "A gross abuse of authority conferred by house bill 72 is responsible for its being referred to the people by petition. A law which subjects taxpayers to the inquisitorial oppression attempted under this bill should be repealed, and a new law enacted that is properly safeguarded."

It would give the state tax commission almost unlimited authority over taxation matters, to administer and control almost everything and everybody that pertained to taxation matters. It isn't good policy. Kill it.

322-323. Nestucca Bay Fish Closing Bill.

This is a referendum called on

a law passed by the last legislature closing the Nestucca Bay and tributaries to commercial fishing. The negative argument in the pamphlet says among other things: "The Nestucca bay and tributaries where commercial fishing is now allowed lie wholly within Tillamook county, and no other county of the state will be directly affected in case this measure becomes a law. The people in Tillamook county who know all the conditions are practically one hundred per cent opposed to this measure, and we submit that the people of this county should be permitted to control their own industries.

"In justice and fairness, and as sensible citizens and sportsmen, we ask you to vote 'NO' on this bill when it comes before you for your sovereign approval or rejection."
