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WHIPPET RACES AT VANCOUVER, JULY 31

An attraction at Vancouver next Sunday, and something unusual in the way of sport, will be the Whippet races. This will be an international derby on the Vancouver speedway held under the rules of the Whippet club of America by which all dogs are handicapped by weight, the heavier the dog the longer the handicap.

Four of the dogs entered were imported direct from England.

A new innovation will be introduced, instead of the public having to identify the dogs by different colored collars, six-inch black numbers printed on a white band encircling the body will be used.

Instead of running four dogs to a heat as has always been done in the west five will compete with the exception of the 3 and 8 months old puppy races, when four will compete.

FOREST LAUDERBACK IS SEVERELY BURNED

Forest Lauderback, employed by Lauderback Brothers at their Pleasant Home slaughter house, is at the home of Mrs. Harriet Timmerman in Gresham, where he is recovering from the effects of severe burns received Monday afternoon when he slipped and one leg went into a vat of boiling water three feet in depth.

The leg was submerged to half way between his hip and knee and the severest burns were experienced around the ankle and back of the knee. He was wearing rubber boots when the accident occurred and the boot filled with the scalding water, causing the conditions to be much worse. Although the burns are severe, it is expected that they will not result seriously. The attending physician considers that the patient will be laid up at least six weeks.

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
