Jersey Cow Joins Select Class.

Plymouth's Thelma 505727, a mature Jersey cow, owned by Messrs. J. & W. H. Gibson has completed an official 365-day test in which she produced 697.16 pounds of fat and 13793 pounds of milk. Her milk averaged 5.05 per cent butterfat for the test. With this record she qualified for the register of merit of the American Jersey Cattle club. Thelma was tested twice previously. In her first test she produced 486.08 pounds of fat as a senior 2-year-old, and in her second test she won a silver medal for producing 601.62 pounds of fat as a junior 4-year-old.
