OREGON CITY EDITOR SPEAKS OUT.

E. A. Koen is the able editor of the Oregon City Banner-Courier. He is also secretary of the Willamette Valley chautauqua association. In arranging his program for the recent chautauqua he had occasion to call on the late congressman Crumpacker at his home near Portland at the time Speaker Nickolas Longworth was Crumpacker's guest.

Editor Koen tells in his paper what he saw and learned and draws some natural conclusions.

Here is what he says:

"Five or six days before Maurice E. Crumpacker jumped into the bay at San Francisco and ended his life, I talked with him as one of the Gladstone chautauqua officials. We sought to secure the appearance of Nicholas Longworth, speaker of the national house of representatives, at the chautauqua.

"Longworth was a guest of the Crumpacker home. We got to the Crumpacker residence, located just within Multnomah county at about 9:30. The maid who answered the ring of the bell said that neither Mr. Crumpacker or Mr. Longworth were up. Another call was made at 10:30. After some wait Mr. Crumpacker came to the door. Although carefully groomed he plainly showed that there had been a night before.

"At about 11 a. m. Mr. Longworth appeared in the front yard, scene of the wait. "This man, looked upon as possible president of the United States, showed still more plainly that there had been a night before. The marks were on his face, upon his person, and there is no doubt in my mind as to what those marks meant.

"Congressman Crumpacker went to San Francisco as the guest of Speaker Longworth, one of the great men of the country. He was found wandering about the streets suffering from what resembled delirium tremens. Taken to a hospital he was treated and released. A few hours later he jumped or fell into the bay and was drowned. "Friday a funeral was held in Portland, attended by all the republican notables in the state. The governor was there, the secretary of state was on hand, as was the state treasurer and other officials, all with the knowledge of the facts in their bosom, paying honor to the dead congressman and trying to forget that Longworth was mixed in the disgraceful affair. For it cannot be so disgraceful upon the public showing, without paying the least attention to the rumors that are floating about.

"Were there not libel laws it would be possible to unmask this whole affair and spread it before

Motor Assn. Plans Crater Lake Trip

Encouraged by the success of its recent Mt. Hood trip the Oregon State Motor association announces a more ambitious trip covering the dates of Aug. 29 to 25 with Crater Lake and the Oregon Caves as its objective.

Starting from Portland at 1 p. m. on Saturday, August 29, the first night will be spent at Eugene.

The route from Eugene will be over the McKenzie river highway and the schedule is as follows:

August 21—McKenzie river highway, Metolius river resorts, Deschutes and Crooked river canyons, Bend. Approximately 175 miles. Stopping for a night at Bend.

August 22—Bend, Lava Caves, Klamath Falls and Crater Lake. 206 miles.

August 23—Leave Crater Lake for Medford via Rogue River and Ashland, Grants Pass and the Oregon Caves. Overnight stop at the Caves. 187 miles.

August 24—Oregon Caves, Grants Pass and the Pacific Highway to Corvallis. Spend the night at Corvallis. 246 miles.

August 25—Leave Corvallis for Newport, thence north via the Roosevelt Highway to Neskeoin and Hebo. East to McMinnville, and north to Portland via the West Side highway. 206 miles.

Personally Conducted. The innovation on this caravan trip will be the "personally conducted" feature, and arrangements have been concluded whereby the various interesting points will be described by persons intimately acquainted with the region and its history.

Stops will be made en route and opportunity given for authorities to speak to the members of the caravan on the many interesting and scenic wonders which will be on display. Do You Know?

Questions and Answers by M. O. Nelson.

ANSWERS.

1. Mt. Hood is probably rising slowly and steadily along with the rest of the Pacific coast. But there is evidence to show that at its last great eruption it blew about 1000 feet off its top.

2. The redwood forests of northern California run over a little into southwestern Oregon. These are of the species sequoia sempervirens. Most of the redwoods that have been planted in Oregon are of the species "gigantea," or the "big" redwoods.

3. The dahlia was named from an early propagator of that flower by the name of Dahl.

4. Technically the term "thoroughbred" is applied only to the English running horse. All other stock that is admitted to registry in herd books and stud books is properly called "purebred". The American trotting horse is called "standardbred".

5. The word "collie" is an old Scotch term meaning smutted by coal. It was probably used in that sense when first applied to the Scotch shepherd dog.

6. There is no sharp line of demarcation between a plum and a prune, but speaking broadly the prune is a plum with fleshy fiber, the plum being softer and more juicy. If a plum will dry well it may be called a prune, though this is not always the case.

7. The Chinese and the French eat snails and consider them very good food.

8. There were no horses in either North or South America when Columbus first saw this country. But there are remains of a small animal of the horse kind that was probably extinct before man came to America.

Phone Calls Now Rapid.

Portland is now closer to 18 neighboring cities than it ever has been before from the standpoint of time required to complete telephone connections.

The local operator will now connect the speaker direct with a telephone number in Oregon City, Salem, Vancouver, or in any other one of the 18 nearby points reached by this new method.

This "number service" means that the caller gives his own number and the town, and the number wanted to the first operator answering. It is in effect to Beaver-ton, Forest Grove, Gresham, Hillsboro, Kelso, Longview, McMinnville, Milwaukie, Newberg, North Plains, Oak Grove, Oregon City, Oswego, Salem, Sherwood, St. Helens, Tigardville and Vancouver.

"This is one of the latest improvements in operating practice which does much to shorten time between cities," said Manager Bacon in discussing the new method. "People already have commenced to use the method following announcements contained in the new August telephone directory now being distributed.

"We now confidently expect the public to cooperate by adopting this new practice which brings our cities into much closer contact."
