Cook of Portland and Miss Mina Gilbert and Mrs. Lorena Kidder of Gresham; her stepmother Mrs. Alice Gilbert and a half brother Eugene Gilbert, both of Boston, Massachusetts.

Funeral services will be conducted Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist church under the direction of the Gresham Funeral parlors. Interment will be made in Lincoln Memorial park.

MICHAEL McMAHAN OBSEQUIES HELD. Michael McMahan, aged 69, formerly employed at St. Mary's home at Beaverton, was buried from St. Henry's Catholic church in Gresham yesterday morning and buried in St. Joseph's cemetery west of here, the Rev. Charles Keveny in charge of the service under the direction of the Gresham Funeral home. Mr. McMahan's death occurred Friday, August 12, at St. Vincent's hospital from cancer of the throat, which he had suffered from for the past two months.

The deceased was born in Ireland and came to the United States at the age of 18. He is survived by two daughters Mrs. John Brophy of Cottrell and Mrs. Charles L. Evans of Fremont, Nebraska, and eight grandchildren.

Young Man in Tolls. An extract from a recent newspaper dispatch from Eugene, Oregon, states that William Kercher, 21, found with ten gallons of liquor in his possession, pleaded guilty to illegal possession and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$250 and spend two months in jail. The Kercher family lives on Route 2, Gresham.

SPED BOWL SCENE OF FATAL ACCIDENT. A fatality marked the progress of the racing program staged Saturday afternoon at the speed bowl between Gresham and the Base Line road, the victim being Lloyd Krohn, 25, of Seattle who died on his way to Emanuel hospital after his racing car had crashed through the fence while going at an estimated speed of 65 miles an hour. The terrified crowd, including the young bride of the man, rushed to his side after he had been thrown and found him unconscious but still alive. The ambulance was hastily called, but death resulted a few minutes later from a broken vertebra in the neck.

The accident took place so quickly the audience could scarcely sense what had happened. Krohn, who was driving his attractive gray Clark special alone at the top of the highly-banked 80-foot track, seemed to lose control of the car, thought to be due to a defect in the steering gear. The machine shot up the remaining few feet to the top of the bank, whizzed through the fence, fell the 10 feet to the ground and turned turtle five or six times before coming to a stop.
