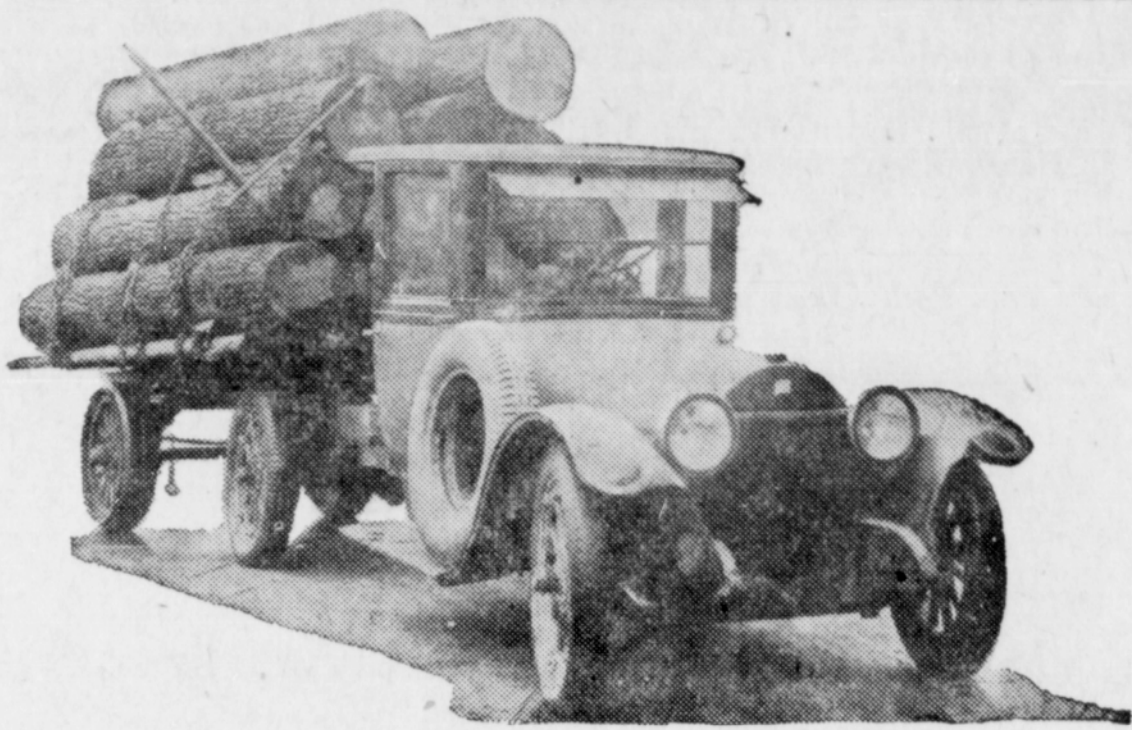


Buick Passenger Car Used as Heavy Duty Truck



One of the severest tests ever imposed on a motor car came to light recently through R. O. Hamil, of Ludington, Michigan, who wrote the Buick Motor company that a modified Buick sedan in his possession was doing satisfactory duty as a seven-ton truck, covering 140 miles each day with loads of logs, according to word received by drive shaft and brake rods.

"This truck is now making two rounds trips on a 35-mile haul, covering 140 miles each day with a load weighing from five to seven tons, which speaks very well for the Buick of 1920." Mr. Hamil is driving his sixth Buick passenger car, and also still has his first, a 1920 sedan which, he writes, is in perfect condition. Walter W. Metzger, local dealer.

Mr. Hamil wrote: "After having Buicks the past seven years with excellent service and little expense, I conceived the idea of putting the front end of a 1920 seven-passenger sedan on the rear end of a well known heavy duty truck. This was accomplished by sawing the frames in two and lapping them together, and also lengthening the
