COUNTY TEACHERS ELECT OFFICERS

George Lusby, principal of the Corbett grade school, was elected president and Mrs. Anne I. Tegart, principal of Fairview school, secretary-treasurer of the Multnomah County Teachers' association at a meeting held Saturday at the court-house. Miss Ethel Matthews of the West Portland school was elected vice president. A large number of teachers received preliminary instructions from County Superintendent W. C. Alderson and his assistant, Miss Eva Campbell.

New textbooks will be required this year on agriculture, arithmetic, history, music and spelling. Special emphasis will be laid on music, literature, domestic science and agriculture, these being considered of vital importance to the grade school pupil. The grade schools of the county began work yesterday morning in the new school year. Several, however, opened the previous Tuesday.

To eradicate household ants, a syrup poisoned with arsenate of soda is effective where it can be safely used. To make it 1 pound of sugar is dissolved in a quart of water to which 125 grains of arsenate of soda is added. Use it after boiling and straining, on sponges, placed where the ants will find them easily. The sponges are collected several times daily and the ants swarming on them are killed by immersion in hot water.
