

FAMOUS COMPOSER WILL GIVE RECITAL

To those who love sacred music the recital to be given Saturday evening at the Powell Valley Mission church by Robert Harkness of Australia, world-famed composer and pianist, will be of intense interest. The program he will render will be made up of selections composed by him. Mr. Harkness has made six round-the-world tours and is one of the world's recognized authorities on gospel song and hymnology. In addition to being the composer of over 2000 gospel songs, he is the author of a unique home study course in sacred piano accompaniment.

The program Saturday evening will be an unusual one. Variations, impromptu compositions and interpretations and histories of the origins of several songs will make up part of the evening's entertainment. A silver offering will be taken during the program.
