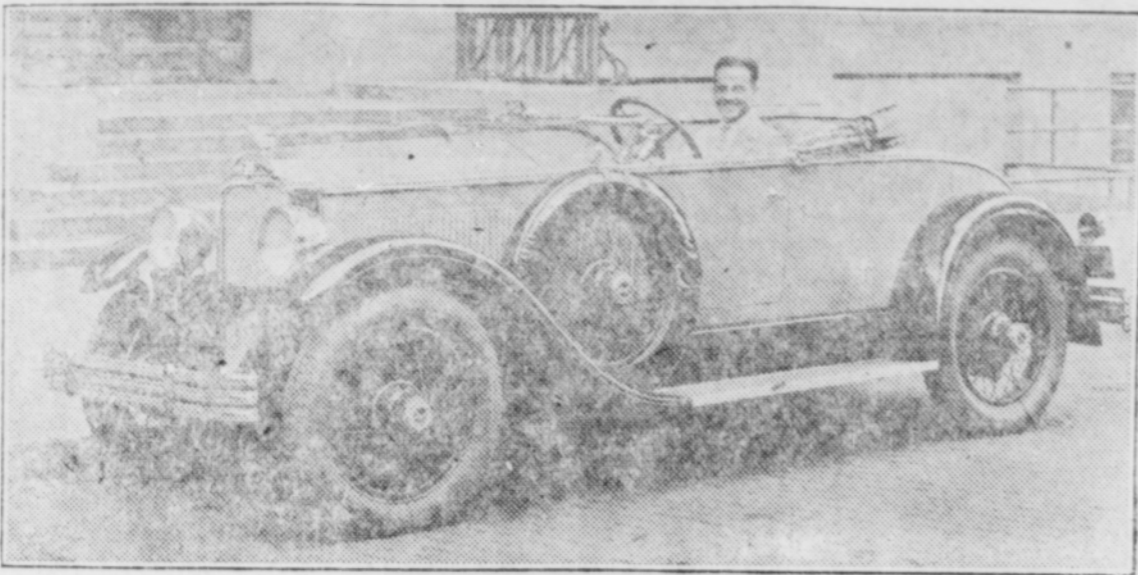


Speed Demon Buys Sixth Buick

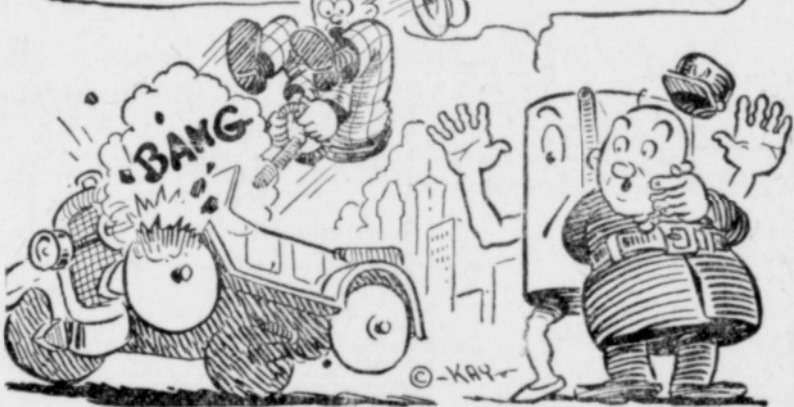

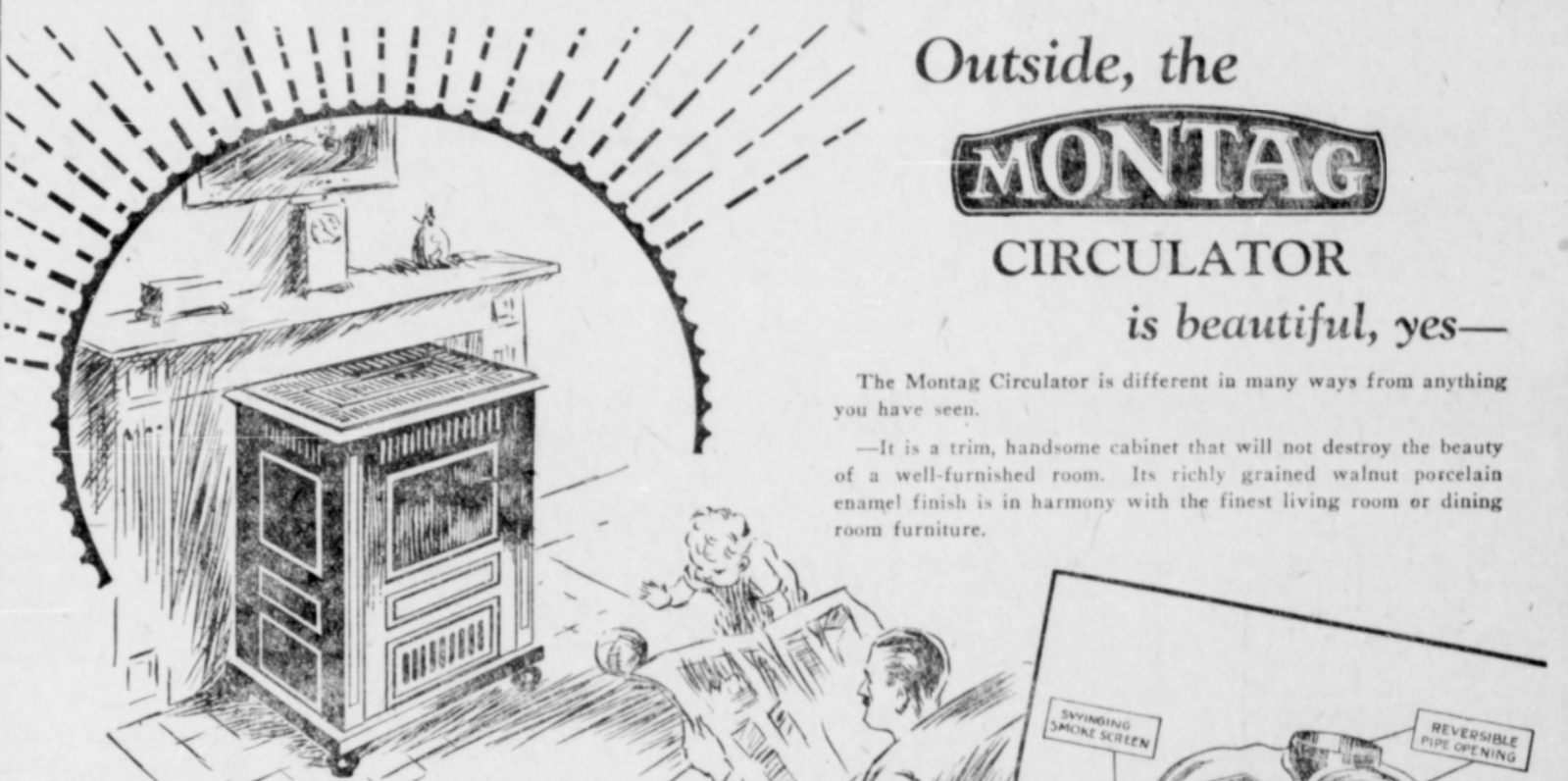

One of the herd sires in the association has 15 daughters (in 6 different herds) averaging 471 pounds of butter fat each. A son of this sire has 5 daughters (3 yearlings and 2 two-year-olds) whose average production is 41 pounds of fat per month.

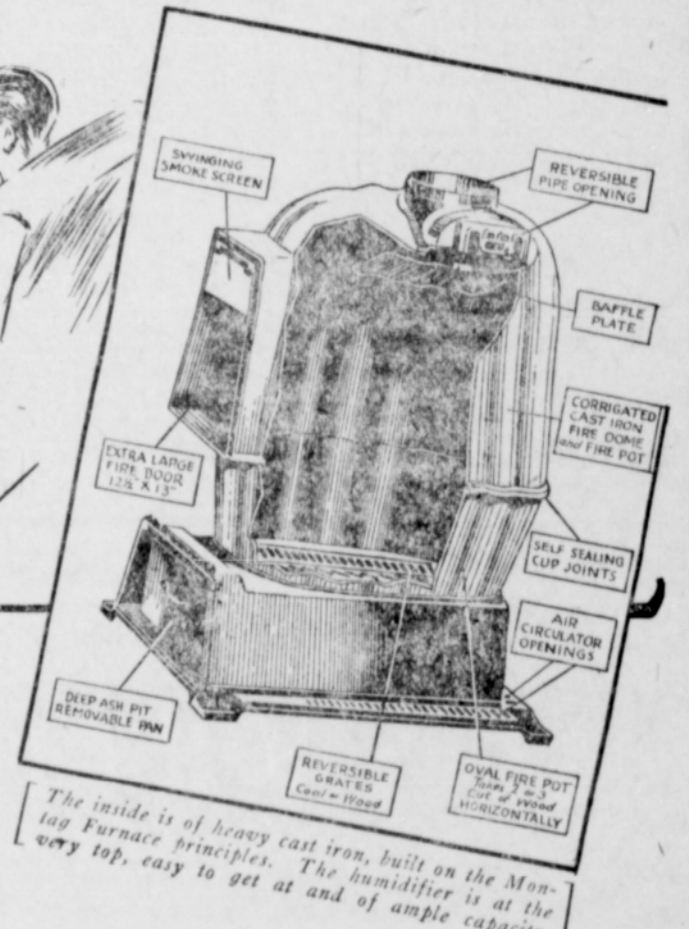
