As the time for filing closes today it appears there will be only two candidates in the race for the office of congressman third district. They are Franklin F. Korell, republican, and Elton Watkins, democrat. The latter has served a term in congress and was defeated two years ago by Maurice Crumpacker whose untimely death caused the vacancy which necessitates the present election.

Watkins, while capable, has not gained the backing of his party, some of whose leaders have tried to promote another democratic nominee. Korell, on the other hand, has the decided choice of the republican precinct committee assembled in convention and it may safely be said he will be the unanimous choice of republican voters.

The election will be held on Tuesday, October 18. Only registered voters may vote as the swearing in of voters on election day has been outlawed.
