Columbus Day will be observed tomorrow in honor of the reputed and generally recognized discovery of the western continent. On this day Columbus, after a venturesome journey of over two months across unknown seas landed on San Salvador, a small island of the West Indies group.

Three days before, his crews in near mutiny, he had promised he would turn back if land was not sighted in three days. The expedition came that near failure. If it had failed someone else would have made the discovery but the results in that case are hard to surmise.

Columbus visited other islands, erected a fort and left some of his men. On his return to Spain he was received with almost royal honors.

That was 435 years ago. A short time in the world's history, but moments have been the results. Columbus' patience, hopefulness, perseverance, resourcefulness, should be an inspiration to us all. Our greatest success may linger close to apparent failure.

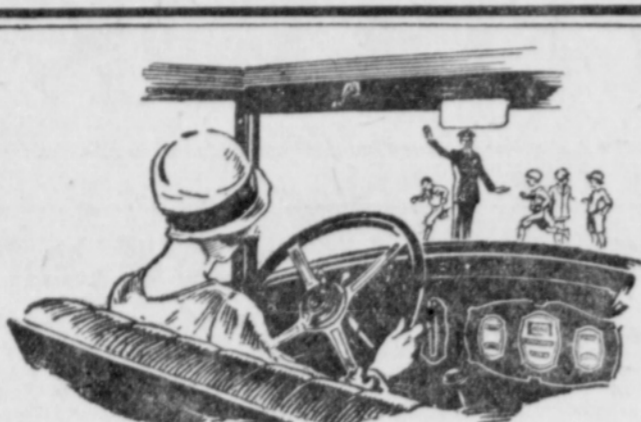
Harold Soderberg of Bull Run is in the hospital, having had an operation on his arm.
