Congressman Korell.

Franklin F. Korell, of Portland, was elected last Tuesday to congress from the third Oregon district which comprises Multnomah county. Only about one-third of the registered vote of the county was cast and Korell received about three votes to Watkin's two of the total tally. Watkin, however, carried a few precincts in Portland.

The total unofficial vote was given in reports Wednesday as 30,437, of which Korell received 17,819 and Watkin 12,618.

Korell thus succeeds the late Maurice E. Crumpacker and fills out the latter's term. Crumpacker was elected a year ago to succeed himself. His second term began last March. The 70th congress will meet for its first session on December 6, next.

When to Buy Feeders.

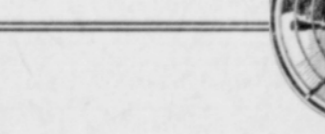
Just what grade of cattle to select for the feed lot is a problem that must be considered by every feeder. There are a number of seasonal factors to be kept in mind in this connection. Common cattle are generally lowest in price in October and November during the time of large runs of cattle from the range. Choice finished cattle are usually higher in price than at any other time of the year because there are ordinarily very few graded steers marketed at this time.
