Civil War Veteran Answers Last Call

William Frederick Smith, for the past five years a rancher living in the Gillis neighborhood five miles southeast of Gresham, passed away at his home on Tuesday, October 25, at the age of 83 years, death being due to the ailments of old age.

Mr. Smith is survived by his widow Mrs. Kate C. Smith; two children Miss Elva M. Smith of Warmsprings, Oregon, and Oliver F. Smith of Los Angeles; two grandchildren, Maurice M. and Alaris A. Smith, Portland; two brothers, August and David W., and a sister Mrs. Mary M. Baumen, all of Missouri.

Funeral services were conducted this morning from Pearsons' Funeral church, with interment following in Lincoln Memorial park. The deceased was a veteran of the Civil War, having served in Company I, 12th Missouri cavalry.

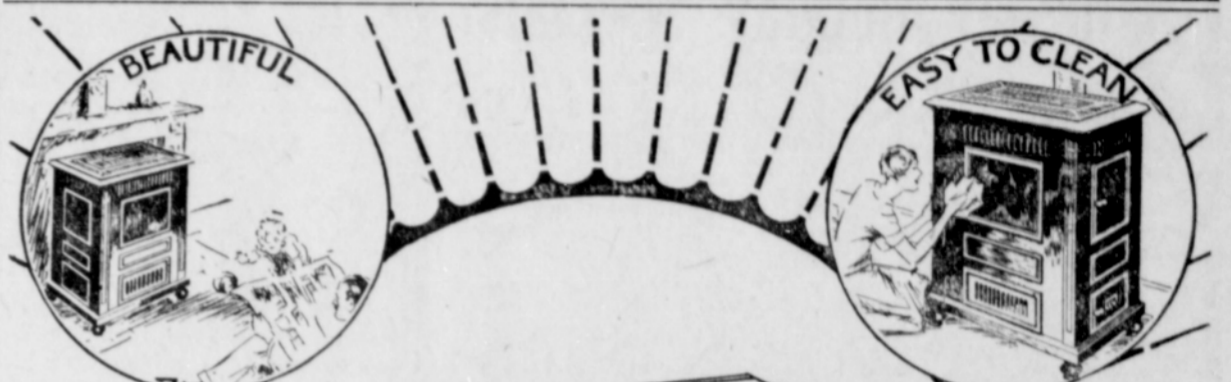
