Coolidge Appeals for Near East. President Coolidge, in a letter of endorsement, has fixed Dec. 4 as the date for the annual observance of Golden Rule Sunday on behalf of the overseas work of the Near East Relief. The president's letter says:

"I regard International Golden Rule Sunday as a movement of much importance. Begun in an attempt to care for the orphan children of Bible lands, it has been extended to other countries.

"Practical help is the best expression of friendship. The aid we give out of our abundance to those less fortunately situated than we, should be of great value in bringing about the application of the Golden Rule to the settlement of misunderstandings among nations as well as among individuals.

The approved method of observing Golden Rule Sunday, according to a statement by Charles V. Vickrey, head of the international committee, is as follows:

"Eat a simple orphanage type of meal,—any American menu would be more elaborate than the actual meals served in the overseas orphanages, where \$5 feeds a child for a whole month. Think of the orphan children; realize their situation,—they have no food, clothing or shelter, no chance to obtain training for life except as American contributors give it to them. Do for these children what you would like to have done for your children if they were left destitute. This is a practical application of the Golden Rule."
