Pankratz, who has leased the center section of the Osburn building on Main street, the former site of the Maytag Washing Machine company office, and is planning to install an up-to-date candy, music and variety store.

Ignaz Friedman to Play With Symphony

The second evening concert of the Portland Symphony orchestra's 17th season, to be presented Monday night at the public auditorium will feature as solo artist, the distinguished Polish pianist, Ignaz Friedman. While this eminent musician has for years been regarded in Europe as one of the outstanding virtuoso pianists of the day, and has been deemed the equal of his great fellow countrymen, Paderewski, Hofman and Pachmann, it has only been since 1921 that he has concertized in America, and it was not until the spring of 1925 that he was heard for the first time on the Pacific coast. Since his initial Portland appearance was in conjunction with a performance of the Portland Symphony society, it is fitting that his second appearance should be under the auspices of the same organization.

Though Europeans had for years looked upon Friedman as one of the greatest of pianoforte virtuosos, the New York critics, as though unaware beforehand of the pianist's capabilities hailed him as a "colossus of the keyboard", as if they had made a momentous discovery. This impression has been upheld everywhere when the artist subsequently toured the entire country. Several years ago, when Friedman performed in Copenhagen, one of the foremost Danish critics stated blandly that if "Chopin were alive today, his name would be Friedman." This may be exaggerated, but it is true that Friedman is adjudged one of the best players of Chopin before the public today. Inasmuch as the Tchaikovsky first concerto was the vehicle for Friedman's first Portland appearance, it is gratifying to learn that the Chopin first concerto, in E Minor, has been selected as the vehicle for the appearance Monday night. This rarely performed work is certainly one of the composer's best, and will give Portlanders the opportunity to hear Friedman at his best.

The Tchaikovsky symphony No. 4 in F Minor, will be the principal orchestral number on Monday's program. Inasmuch as this was the symphony Willem van Hoogstraten conductor of the Portland Symphony orchestra, selected for his opening concert in this city two years ago, its repetition will be welcomed. The pizzicato and finale of the symphony are among the most popular excerpts from Tchaikovsky's works. The opening number will be the familiar overture to "Sakuntala" (Carl Goldmark).
