BORING MAN SECURES DAMAGE JUDGMENT

A case has just been decided in an Oregon City court involving E. D. Wilson of Boring and Emil Bittner of Sandy, in which the latter was sued by Wilson for \$5000 damages for injuries sustained when the motorcycle on which Wilson was riding collided with the Bittner truck about a year ago on the road between Boring and the Mt. Hood Loop highway. Wilson failed to secure the full amount of his claim, however, the jury deciding on \$1500 as the amount of the personal damages to be awarded him.

It was brought out in the trial, according to the testimony offered, that Bittner saw the motorcycle at a distance of 500 feet ahead of him but thought the driver would move to one side. In the collision Wilson's hand was caught between the handle bars and the truck and a finger badly smashed. The interests of Mr. Wilson were handled by W. J. Cooper, and those of the defendant by Portland attorneys. The case was tried last April but resulted in a tie of the jury, six standing for acquittal and six for the award of damages.

Troutdale Teachers Are Given Honors

Following a ruling by the State Parent-Teacher association that a day be set aside for Teachers' Day, the Troutdale P.-T.A. observed Thursday, November 10 as such. The chrysanthemum was chosen as the flower for the occasion, and all students of the school and all who attended the meeting wore the flowers. Mrs. L. A. Harlow paid a tribute to the teachers in the following beautiful speech while lunch was being served by Mrs. Thomas Low and Mrs. Harlow.

"It is very fitting that we workers of the school and home should put aside one day in our year's activities to pay tribute to our teachers, because, next to Mother's Day and Father's Day, what could be nearer to us than Teacher's Day?"

"Pause and think a moment how much we owe these faithful workers; how important a part they play in the lives of our children; what a large share they give to the moulding of the characters of the future men and women of the nation, and we owe them a bigger debt of gratitude than we realize.

"When we think that our children leave home as babies almost, and are put in the care and under the guidance of their first teacher, who must play the part of mother, father and nurse as well as teacher, do we realize her responsible position? Then the child passes on through other stages of development into the care of other teachers, whose parts are equally important and difficult to play according to the age of the child.

"We surely owe them a great debt and we parents realize that their positions do not always lie along a path of roses. There are many things to disturb, irritate and discourage them. We all understand children well enough to know that. Yet in the end, it is such a noble calling and carries with it much more joy than sorrow, and it must be a satisfaction to them to know that they are playing such a big part in the world's home life, and that there is no nobler nor more splendid work to be done than to help lead a child in the way he should go.

"For these reasons they are more than repaid for the unpleasantness that is bound to occur at times."

After all had risen as a tribute to the teachers, R. D. Hewitt, the principal, gave a response in the following poem:

"I've a cheer for the hearts of the earnest
I've a praise for the aims carried through
For their clinging to ways that are sternest
When these are the ways of the true.
"I praise the cooperation
That shall gain the triumph for plans
To insure us the youth of our nation
Shall reap the reward that is man's.
"There's a power in a common endeavor,
So in wisdom, our work is combined,
As good parents and teachers we'll ever
Find our efforts and aims intertwined."

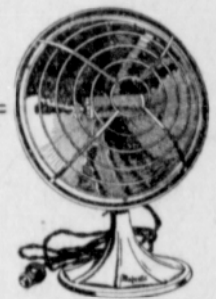
