Passing generations have tossed to us the torch of opportunity; we must hold it aloft and pass it to coming generations undimmed. To be permitted to live in this period of opportunity, to have health, strength and vigor to stand for the right, is a glorious privilege. It should call forth the very best within us, that we may face the sunrise of tomorrow with high hopes, courage, and strong hearts, unafraid. The Republic calls for the best that her sons and daughters can give. We dare not and will not fail."

AUCTION SALE WILL AID MISSION FUND

In pursuance of the custom of the Seventh Day Adventist church, and carrying out the object of the church to spread the gospel, a vigorous campaign for foreign missions has been carried on in the Gresham territory for the past month. A generous response has been made by those to whom the needs in the foreign field have been explained, and about \$200 have been raised for the program. An additional \$100 will be needed to reach the goal set for the local church, a part

of which has already been pledged. It is hoped to raise the balance at a barn entertainment and auction sale to be held at the new barn of Reubin Treher on the Section Line road a mile east of Gresham on Saturday evening, November 26, beginning at 7:30 o'clock.

A good program by local talent has been arranged, consisting of readings, recitations and music. The conference male quartet will be present to sing, the Wilson orchestra of four instruments will play several selections, and a member of the orchestra will play the saw. Mrs. Clara Webb Smith of Columbia college, formerly of Gresham, will give a reading.

Following the program there will be a period for play and visiting. Supper will be served cafeteria style, after which an auction sale will be held of aprons, fancy work, canned fruit, honey, potatoes and other vegetables and other articles too numerous to mention.

The proceeds of the supper and sale will be applied to the general mission fund. It is promised by those in charge that every dollar contributed 100 cents will be spent on the mission field.

Admission to the entertainment will be free and all are invited to enjoy this old fashioned barn party.

GHANDI URGES NEW THINGS FOR INDIA

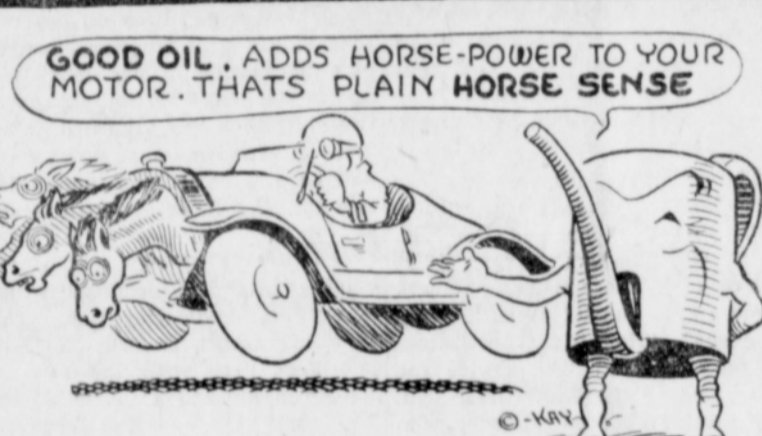
