Mr. Chapman was born at Clackamas, Oregon, but for the past 14 years has been a resident of Springdale. He was a man of prominence in his community. He had been actively connected with the state institution for feeble minded at Salem and was an intimate friend of the family of Governor Patterson.

Funeral services will be held at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Gospel hall at Springdale under the direction of the Metzger undertaking parlors of Gresham. Interment will be made in Clackamas cemetery.
