ELLY NEY TO APPEAR IN SYMPHONY CONCERT

Elly Ney, eminent pianist and wife of Willem van Hoogstraten, conductor of the Portland Symphony orchestra, will be heard in her third consecutive annual Portland appearance, as soloist with the orchestra at its concert Monday night, January 16. Capacity audiences greeted Mme. Ney the two occasions when she appeared with the orchestra during past seasons, and her coming for a third appearance is being enthusiastically anticipated. The joint appearance of husband and wife, orchestral conductor and pianoforte soloist is a unique one, and whether held in Berlin, New York, Los Angeles or Portland, is invariably an occasion that commands widespread public interest. Mme. Ney landed in America last week, after giving more than 50 concerts in Europe since the end of summer. She is coming almost directly to Portland. She will linger in this city for several days, as she regards it as being her American home, even though concert bookings will not permit her to remain here for any great length of time.

Mme. Ney was one of the principal artists participating in the Beethoven centennial observances last season. In fact, her interpretations of the Beethoven "Emperor" concerto and the "Hammerklavier" sonata, have lingered in the minds of those Portlanders who heard her perform those masterpieces. She is not in the strict sense, a specialist, and what emphasizes most notably, her surprising versatility, is the announcement that she is to play a Mozart concerto and a Liszt fantasy with the orchestra at the January 16 concert. While all six of the Mozart pianoforte concertos are perfect examples of their class of composition, the B-flat major, which Mme. Ney has selected for her Portland appearance, represents as fully as any, the virtues of the Mozartian technique.

Counterpoised opposite the Mozart will be the Liszt fantasy on Schubert's "The Wanderer." This work represents Liszt at the acme of his powers as an adapter of great melodies to the pianoforte. This brilliant work is remotely comparable with the composer's "Hungarian Rhapsodies," but is unique in that it is unmistakably Lisztian and at the same time quintessentially Schubertian.

As the two pianoforte and orchestra numbers will necessarily occupy the greater part of the time allotted for the program, only two all-orchestral numbers will be presented. These will be the popular "Fingal's Cave" or "Hebrides" overture (Mendelssohn), and the tone poem, "Pines of Rome" (Respighi), which was given its Portland premiere by the orchestra last season.

McMANUSES OCCUPY FINE NEW RESIDENCE

Mr. and Mrs. A. McManus moved on Tuesday into their handsome new residence on a two-acre tract on Division street. This home occupies a slightly location on the south side of the street, with a background of evergreens. The house is 30 x 32 feet in size, exclusive of the sun room on the east. French doors connect the dining room with the large living room, and in the latter is located a fireplace. Hardwood floors have been laid throughout the six-room house.

One of the most desirable features of the new home is the abundance of ample clothes closets. These are fitted into every available space and are finished with glass knob fittings to match those on the doors. The walls are of hard white finish, with the exception of kitchen and bathroom where the finish is of enamel. The bathroom is equipped with a shower in addition to the regular hot and cold water appliances.

A Montax furnace has been installed in the full concrete basement by Joe Chiodo of Gresham Plumbing & Heating company. George Webster had the contract for the new building. The wiring was done by George Lewis for the Radio Electric company. Lighting fixtures and other fittings are of the latest design. Mr. McManus expects to begin the development of a lawn within a short time.

The following are cited as a few of the outstanding accomplishments of the Whippet: Cannonball Baker drove a Whippet from coast to coast, a distance of 3,569 miles, averaging 43.28 miles to the gallon of fuel. This record was made under the official observation of the A.A.A. Ed Hughes drove a Whippet from a point in Death Valley, 284 feet below sea level, to a point in White mountains, 13,150 feet above sea level, the highest point ever reached by any automobile on the Pacific coast.

Ten thousand persons saw a Whippet climb the trackless Stone mountain near Atlanta, Georgia. The Whippet was the first light car to accomplish the climb. Only three cars have ever made the grade, the other two being much larger and more expensive automobiles.

In a speed run from Atlanta to Macon, Georgia, a Whippet averaged 45.3 miles an hour. "Traveling 1,845 miles from Canada to Mexico a Whippet averaged 29.3 miles to the gallon of gasoline. One of the best speed records of the Whippet was a 50-mile test on Rockingham speedway in which the fast four-cylinder light car averaged 71.6 miles an hour.

A Whippet a few weeks ago broke all existing records for climbing the difficult Mt. Diablo in California, negotiating the steep, curved grade, 11 1/2 miles, in 24 minutes, 6 seconds.

Chet Kilmeyer drove a Whippet from Sacramento to New York City, 3,205 miles, in 5 days, 3 hours and 47 minutes. This was officially checked by Western Union.

Traveling in second gear only, a Whippet covered 135 miles in 4 hours, 3 minutes, averaging 33.33 miles an hour.

Completion of this road will provide a paved highway from Portland to Boring, via Clackamas station. The distance from southeast Portland to the Sandy section will be lessened between four and five miles. Gresham is eliminated in the new route. When this paving is completed, a paved road will be brought within three miles of Sandy, both from Portland and Oregon City.

Another road project which will be of great value to Clackamas county is the Foot Line road which will give a direct route for Califor-
