NEWS FROM MANY NEIGHBORHOODS

LAST RITES HELD FOR PLEASANT HOME WOMAN

The funeral services for Mrs. P. M. Miller, who died at her home here January 4, were held at the Pleasant Home Baptist church on Friday afternoon, January 6. The Rev. J. W. Stockton, assisted by the Rev. Wm. Fairweather, conducted the services with the Gates undertakers in charge. A quartet composed of Mrs. John Campbell, Mrs. Jas. Hillyard, the Rev. Frank Brower, and H. Lee Ball sang. Rev. Mr. Fairweather also sang as a solo, Mrs. Miller's favorite song, "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus." At the close of the service the entire audience joined in singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." The whole service was one of the most impressive ever held here, and seemed rather more a praise service to the Father of all that he had taken unto himself one who had so faithfully served him through a long life, and was now free from the suffering and sorrows of this world.

Priscilla M. Connor was born in Virginia, February 7, 1844, and grew to young womanhood there, uniting with the Baptist church in the same community when a young girl. She married Lewis Miller and in 1869 they moved to Tennessee where they resided until coming to Oregon in 1883. Since Mr. Miller's death 11 years ago Mrs. Miller has resided on the home place being cared for by her daughter, Ida, who gave the best years of her life in loving care of both her parents.

Mrs. Miller united with the Bethel Baptist church of Gresham soon after coming to Oregon, and later became a charter member of the Pleasant Home Baptist church when it was organized.

Surviving are the following children, all of whom were present at the funeral: Marlon C. Miller, Coquille, Oregon; William A. Miller, Boring; Raymond Miller, Portland; Lewis K. Miller, Pleasant Home; Mrs. Ida M. Nelson, Pleasant Home, and Mrs. Priscilla M. Jones, Waterville, Washington, also a number of grandchildren and two great grand children.

AGED SANDY PIONEER DIES IN PORTLAND

Mrs. Julia C. Branham, aged 79 years, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Dora Thompson, 1228 E. 19th street, Portland, January 4, 1928. Funeral services were held at Finley's Undertaking parlors, and vault entombment was made in Lincoln Memorial park.

Julia C. St. John crossed the plains in 1854 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. St. John, who settled at Sandy, Oregon, where they lived for many years. She was married in 1873 to James C. Branham who, with the one daughter, survives her. In 1890 Mr. and Mrs. Branham moved to Troutdale, where they built the first hotel in that place and operated it for many years. They afterwards moved to Portland.

Older residents in this vicinity and Sandy will remember Mr. and Mrs. Branham. Both attended the meeting of pioneers and old settlers held in Sandy last summer, where they had seats of honor.

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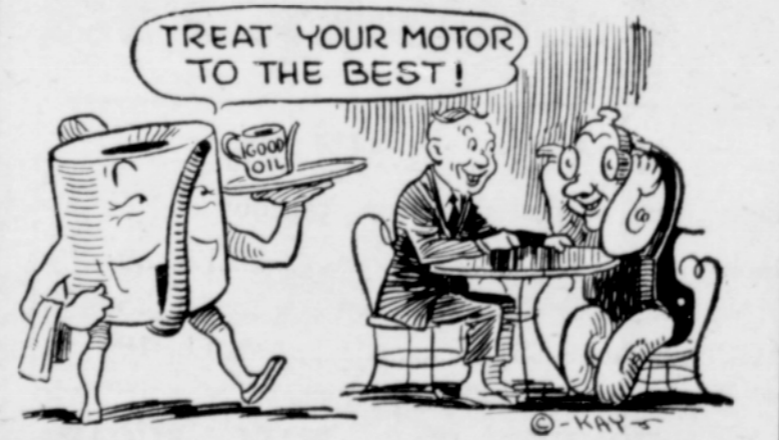
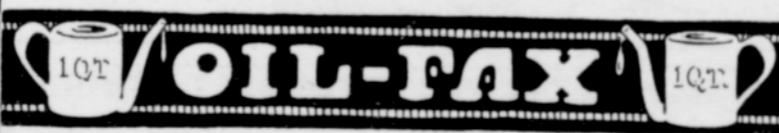
