Excavation for the foundation of the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles was started last Friday by J. E. McClaskey, the local contractor whose bid for the job was accepted by the Board of Control. The work is expected to be finished about February 20th at which time 2,850 cubic feet of earth will have been moved. The construction work will begin as soon as possible after the grading is finished.

This hospital was authorized by popular vote at the general election of November, 1926, having been sponsored by the Oregon Tuberculosis association and its affiliated county public health associations. Practically every civic organization in the state aided in promoting the institution. The majority in favor of the hospital totaled 82,000.

ANSWERS.

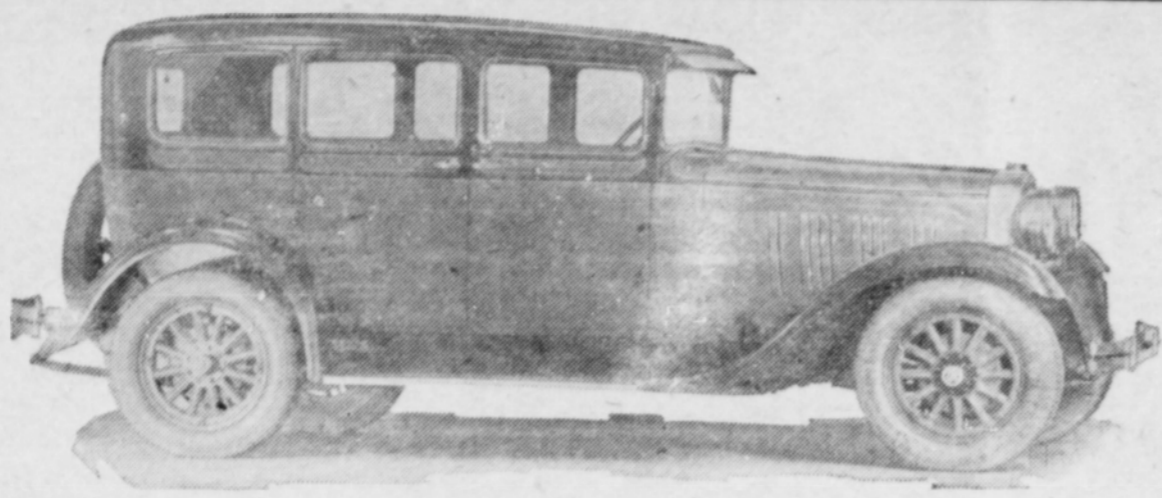
- 1. Resin is the sap of the pine tree or other coniferous tree. Rosin is this sap after the turpentine has been evaporated from it.
2. In Columbus' fleet of discovery the flagship, the Santa Maria, was of 130 tons and carried a crew of 70; the Pinta was of 50 tons with a crew of 20; the Nina of 40 tons with a crew of 20. Only the flagship was decked.
3. The smallest transoceanic steamer considered profitable today is of 10,000 tons.
4. Slavery was legal in Brazil till 1851 when a law was enacted making children of all slaves free at age of 21. A fund was also provided for the purchase of slaves not of this class and all government slaves were immediately freed. Under this law one-half of the 3,000,000 slaves were freed by 1875. Finally in 1888 the remaining slaves, then numbering about 500,000, were freed by federal law.
5. The name Rio Grande, means Big river; Rio Negro, Black river; Rio Blanco, White river; Rio Colorado, Red river; Rio de la Plata, the River of the Plain; Rio Janeiro, the River of January.
6. The Argentine Republic, meaning the Silver Republic, was named Argentine by early explorers who believed the country to contain great silver mines, which it did not.
7. The entire name of Bahia, one of the principal ports of Brazil, is Sao Salvador de Bahia Todos os Santos, which means Holy Savior of the Bay of all the Saints. It is called Bay (Bahia) for short.
8. Solon was the most noted of the "Seven Wise Men" of ancient Greece. He was the principal author of a wise code of laws. From him legislators are sometimes called "Solons".

GREATER SAFETY IN VICTORY SIX

Double Steel Walls Provide Double Safety and Augment Advantages.

Although the war is over we are still profiting by its lessons, and no where is this fact more apparent than in the production of the Victory Six, an entirely new Dodge Brothers car. Two revolutionary principles characterize it. It is the first car in which body and chassis are in one unit, and in the Victory Six for the first time in the history of the steel body a double steel wall is found in the body of a closed car.

It is in this latter departure that principles learned in the war are reflected—particularly the important one of providing for a second line of defense. The double steel wall is just that. Even if the outer wall should be penetrated, the inner one would still stand as a

second defense for the occupants. The double steel actually means double safety. Tests have proved that it is practically impossible to penetrate both walls. This double steel wall is the same "blister" construction used in battleships, and is virtually an answer to the increasingly important demands of automobile clubs, civic organizations and the motor driving public for heavy steel construction in motor cars as well as in railroad cars and buses—demands recently expressed in a symposium collected by Percival White, prominent consulting engineer.

However, in spite of the double strength resulting, the Victory Six retains the top lightness necessary to keep it from overturning, for the building of body and chassis one strong unit alone means the saving of 175 pounds. It is lighter than any other car of equal strength. Each car body is composed of only eight major parts, and there are from 330 to 480 fewer parts than in the ordinary body.

A Non-Tippable Pyramid.

Perhaps the most important effect of the one-piece construction is that it means a decided lowering of the center of gravity of the car, making of the Victory virtually an untippable pyramid with engine, transmission, and axles—the heavy parts—all swung as low as possible between the wheels. Heretofore, in an effort to obtain the lowest possible center of gravity, engineers have been reducing headroom and road-clearance to a disadvantageous degree. The desired result has been accomplished in the Victory Six without resorting to either of these two means, for the one-piece construction permits the elimination of body sills—a saving in height of at least two inches.

In addition, this union of body and chassis gives still greater safety since stress formerly transmitted to the body sills is now taken by the frame, giving the strength and firmness of steel to parts formerly made of wood. The natural result is a longer life both for the car as a whole and for the tires, as well as greater tire and gasoline mileage.

Performances Prove Car's Success Success of the new construction methods employed in the Victory Six is reflected in its performance. The car has an easy speed of 65 miles an hour, goes 21 miles on a gallon of gasoline at a speed of 25 miles an hour, and accelerates from 5 to 25 miles an hour in eight seconds, and from 10 to 45 miles in 15 seconds.

Other features of the new car are a cooling system which introduces cool water at various points in the engine, instead of only one place, a crankshaft free from vibration at any speed, an oil system which provides more oil the faster one drives. Lockheed hydraulic four-wheel brakes, semi-elliptic springs both front and rear, single-plate clutch, selective sliding-gear transmission and standard gear shift.
