

Death Calls Aged Resident of Boring

Mrs. S. J. Hupp passed away at the home of her granddaughter Mrs. Edna Thomas of Marion, Oregon, on January 18. Mrs. Hupp was born in Ohio, November 22, 1846. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Robert Plitt, pioneers of Ohio. She was married to F. A. Hupp in 1869, after which they moved to Kansas then to Oklahoma, and in 1912 they moved to Boring where she has made her home. Mr. Hupp passed away in July, 1913. Since that time she has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. George Dreisel. While visiting with her relatives near Marion she was taken ill and the immediate cause of her death was hardening of the arteries. Mrs. Hupp was a member of the Methodist church at Boring. The funeral services were conducted at the home of her granddaughter at Marion on Saturday and she was laid to rest in the Damascus cemetery Saturday afternoon. A brief service was held at the grave in charge of the Methodist pastor from Marion.

Mrs. Hupp was the mother of nine children of which three survive. Charley of Marion, Harry of Morrison, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Lettie Dreisel of Boring. She also leaves four sisters and two brothers, eleven grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

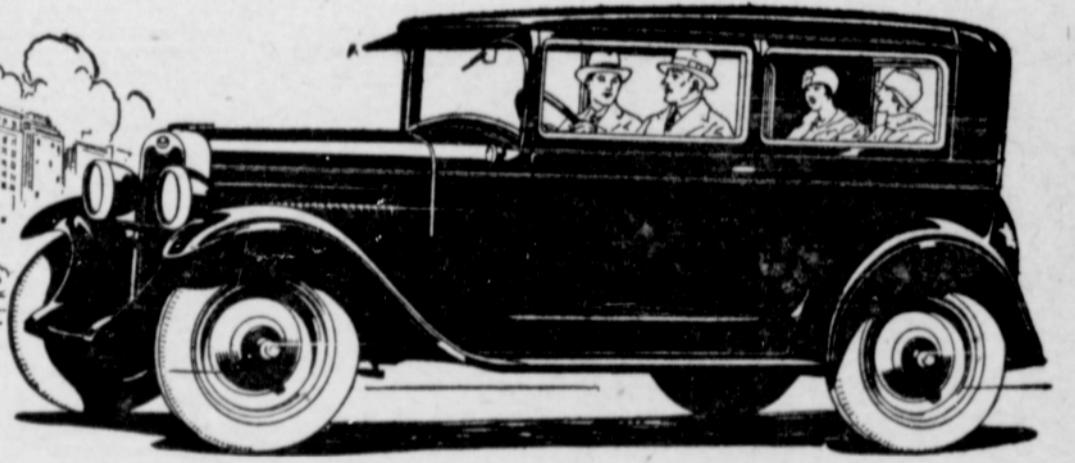


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
