LYNCH

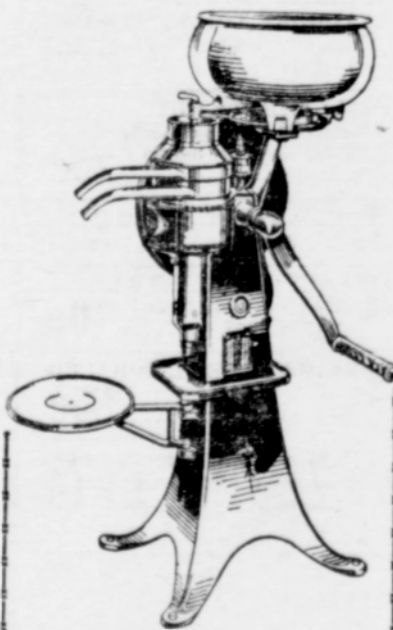
A masquerade dance and card party are being arranged for this evening to take place at the Lynch schoolhouse under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher association.

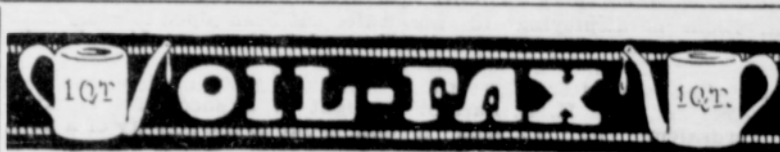
