FARM LEGISLATION.

Legislation in congress for the relief of agriculture is meeting with difficulty because its proponents are divided on methods. The "equalization fee" of the McNary-Haugen measure seems to be a stumbling block which threatens its defeat and the national grange is urging that its "export debenture" plan be substituted for that feature of the McNary bill.

In so urging they assert: "We know that the plan will accomplish practically the identical results sought by farmers through the 'equalization fee' plan and with very much less trouble, expense and administrative machinery. We believe that our bill removes the principal objections raised by President Coolidge and others against the bill."

Ex-Service Men to Benefit by Fund

The United States plans to extend the most generous benefits to its ex-service men. An announcement of meetings and the substance of the plan is given in the following statement by Fred G. Taylor and a copy of the letter being sent to ex-service men in Oregon.

Mayors and presidents of the chambers of commerce of 30 cities of the state are cooperating with the Salvation Army, the Red Cross and others in the plans for the mass meetings this month and next to inform world war veterans everywhere of their rights under veterans legislation.

These meetings have been called by Governor Patterson, Major Albert E. Baynton, divisional commander of the Salvation Army; Judge Stevenson, chairman of the Portland chapter of the Red Cross and by the various officials of cities throughout the state.

The investigations conducted in the interest of the veteran have revealed that a large percentage do not know of the veterans legislation that has been enacted in their interest. It is to carry this information that the meetings have been called. Inquiries have disclosed that few veterans, comparatively, know of the hospital service that can be theirs in case of need. Many of them still do not know that they may turn in their cash bonus from the state, with interest, and obtain a loan of \$3000 from the state to finance home building and other constructive enterprises.

Letters similar to the following are being sent out to all veterans in the state calling their attention to the meetings.

Mr. World War Veteran: This will be news to you. You have inherited \$6500 by virtue of your war time service.

You know that the United States government, in recognition of your war service, offers you an absolutely free of any cost whatsoever, the following: Free hospital care; free doctor's care; free surgical services; free medical services; free physical examinations; free X-ray pictures; free electrical treatments; free treatments for every known disease; free ambulance service in case of accident or emergency; free room while in the hospital; free railroad or auto transportation to government hospitals and free return trip home; free and unlimited hospitalization.

All of the above is offered to you as a veteran of the world war for the rest of your life regardless of whether or not you remain in the service, is incident to your war-time service.

If your sickness or disability is of service origin, then you will receive compensation in varying amounts from \$10 to \$100 per month, according to the degree of your disability for the rest of your life.

In a lifetime, the above free government service would cost you approximately \$5000, but you have inherited all of this free.

You know that now you have the privilege of selecting \$5000 from the state of Oregon to build or buy yourself a new home, secure farm property or use the \$3000 cash in your business, or buy any other thing that you might want to buy, even in cash.

Do this if this is offered to you because of your war-time service.

You know that as a world warrior you have a 10 per cent preferential on employment in the federal civil service.

You know that you are given preference in employment on state public works, because of your war-time service?

Do you know that you are entitled to a full pension, including free headstone for your grave in the event of your death?

Do you know that if you enlisted in another state in the union that you may be entitled to another state bonus?

Mr. Ex-Service Man, we believe that you should be thoroughly familiar with the details of the above-named benefits and other benefits that every world war veteran is entitled to and in order that full information may be imparted to you, you are recommended to attend at 10 o'clock sharp at a monster mass meeting of world war veterans.

A meeting to explain and further the plan will be held in the high school gym Monday night, February 13, at 7:30. All ex-service men are urged to attend.
