his automobile for transportation, but is obliged to open and shut several gates in order to get out. He is anxious to have a road established.

A draft of the parking ordinance was read and some changes ordered. These will be made and the ordinance come up for action at the next regular council meeting. An addition to the former plan would give day or night marshal or other police officer the right to move any cars which might be parked within 10 feet of a fire hydrant contrary to law. The draft to be submitted will make it unlawful for busses to stop in the two-hour parking district to discharge passengers excepting at the stage terminal and on Main street north of Second. This will not prevent them from stopping to take on passengers, as that will be done more quickly.

J. A. Bushong appeared before the council and asked that some graveling be done on Third street west of Main, as the street is in bad condition. The matter was referred to the committee on streets and the marshal.

A pleasant diversion from the grind of routine business was enjoyed on the invitation of the members of the fire department, who invited the city officials to repair to the fire hall, where sandwiches and coffee were served. Twenty-one firemen were present, and all the city officials but one councilman. Brief talks were given by firemen and city officials. The firemen explained their effort to raise funds, one purpose of which was to raise funds for uniforms to be worn on formal occasions. "It would give some of us a chance to have a change of clothes," said Dick Jennings. The firemen's dance to be held tonight at Raker's garage is the first effort of the present fire department to raise money for their purposes.
