Airplanes at Auto Show.

The silver-tinted Ryan monoplane, "The Queen of the Cascades," a sister ship of the one flown by Colonel Lindbergh across the Atlantic stole the honors at the airplane exhibit of the auto show in Portland last week. Tex Rankin, who entered the airplane in the show, flew the \$11,500 monoplane from San Diego just in time for the opening of the annual event. "The Queen of the Cascades" is the first of the group of airplanes which the Rankin school of flying will use this summer on the scenic air tour around Mount Hood.

Six airplanes were entered in the show including Waco, Heath Monoplane, American Eagle, Eagle-Cross, Travel Air and the attraction of the entire display, the distinctive and attractive Ryan mechanical half of the famous "Waco". The contour of the ship and its equipment is identical with that flown by Lindbergh with the exception that Rankin has room for four passengers in the luxuriously upholstered cabin where Lindbergh had gasoline tanks.

The Ryan was flown from San Diego to Portland, more than 1500 miles by airline, in 13 hours. It has a top speed of 125 miles an hour and a cruising speed of 110 miles an hour. It is equipped with the latest devices and is the newest thing in aviation—the most modern airplane of its kind now on the market.

It is so furnished that four passengers can ride with comfort at any altitude. The cabin is like the inside of a sedan with large glass windows in front and on the sides. It was estimated that more than 50,000 persons saw the airplane in the first three days of the show.
