

Oscar Nelson Dies After Long Illness

After months of suffering from carcinoma, death came to the relief of Oscar Nelson, Thursday in Emanuel hospital where he had been for the past six weeks. The deceased was 49 years of age and had been living for some time past with his son Ernest on a small berry ranch a short distance north of Pleasant Home. The funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon from a Portland undertaking chapel, with interment in Douglas cemetery. Mr. Nelson was well known in the Powell Valley district, and a good number from that locality attended the funeral. The Rev. Mr. Johnson, pastor of Immanuel Lutheran church in Portland, preached the funeral sermon. Mr. Nelson is survived by two children Ernest and Lillie; two brothers August and John in North Dakota, and a sister Mrs. Annie Olsen of Oberon, North Dakota. The aged parents of the deceased are living in Sweden. Mr. Nelson was a member of the Aberdeen, Washington, lodges of Modern Woodmen of America and Loyal Order of Moose.
