Mrs. E. C. Sager Dies at Pleasant Valley

Mrs. Elvina Cardwell Sager, whose death occurred February 16, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. T. P. Campbell in Pleasant Valley, was born in Davidson county near Nashville, Tennessee, April 5, 1845.

When a child she moved with her parents to Mt. Ayr, Iowa, where she grew to womanhood. She was united in marriage to Chancy Sager January 8, 1864. Mr. and Mrs. Sager resided in Iowa until the fall of 1874, when they came to Oregon, coming by way of the Union Pacific railroad to San Francisco, and from San Francisco to Portland by steamer. Their first winter in Oregon was spent in Salem. In the spring of 1875 Mr. and Mrs. Sager moved onto a farm near Bethel, in Polk county, where they resided until the spring of 1881, when they came to Pleasant Valley to make their future home. With the exception of a few years' residence in Lents, Mrs. Sager has made this place her home. Her husband's death occurred January 8, 1908.

The funeral rites were held in the Lents Methodist church, the Rev. E. A. Smith officiating. Mrs. Sager became affiliated with the Presbyterian church in early life.

The large concourse which filled the church to overflowing attested the esteem and love of those whose good fortune it was to come under the influence of this good woman's kindly words and deeds.

The following children were left to mourn her departure: G. N. Sager, H. F. Sager and Mrs. Cora Campbell of Pleasant Valley; A. G. Sager, Clyde E. Sager and Mrs. Myrtle Hills of Portland, and Mrs. Jessie Kemp of Hutton, Alberta, Canada.

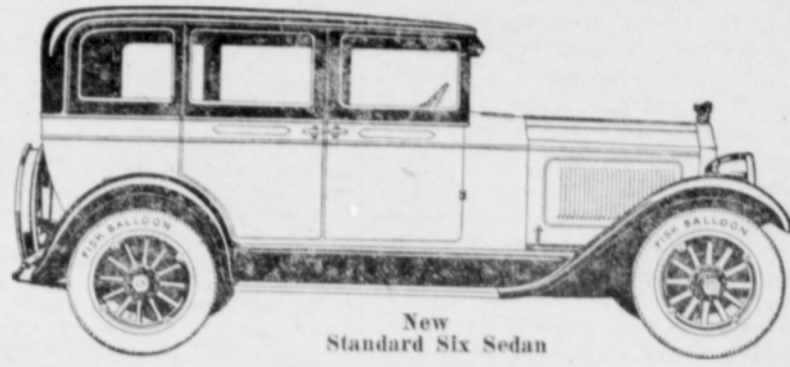
