**WORK IS RESUMED ON  
BEAR CREEK PROJECT**

Activities on dam construction at the site of the great Bear Creek reservoir, seven miles above the Bull Run headworks, are being resumed this week after a partial cessation of the work since the big storm of the first of the year.

The huge gravel digger is being put into commission for the first time since the storm, the gravel supply for nearly two months past having been obtained from a small digger located near the dam. The big digger is located in close proximity to railroad cars which carry the material to the mixer.

From 250 to 300 men will be employed again.

Work on the clearing of the 460 acres comprising the reservoir site has progressed rapidly. About 150 acres of land at the lower part of the site are cleared and cleaned, 378 acres have been brushed, and on 347 acres most of the trees are down. Burning is now in progress. All merchantable timber is being saved.

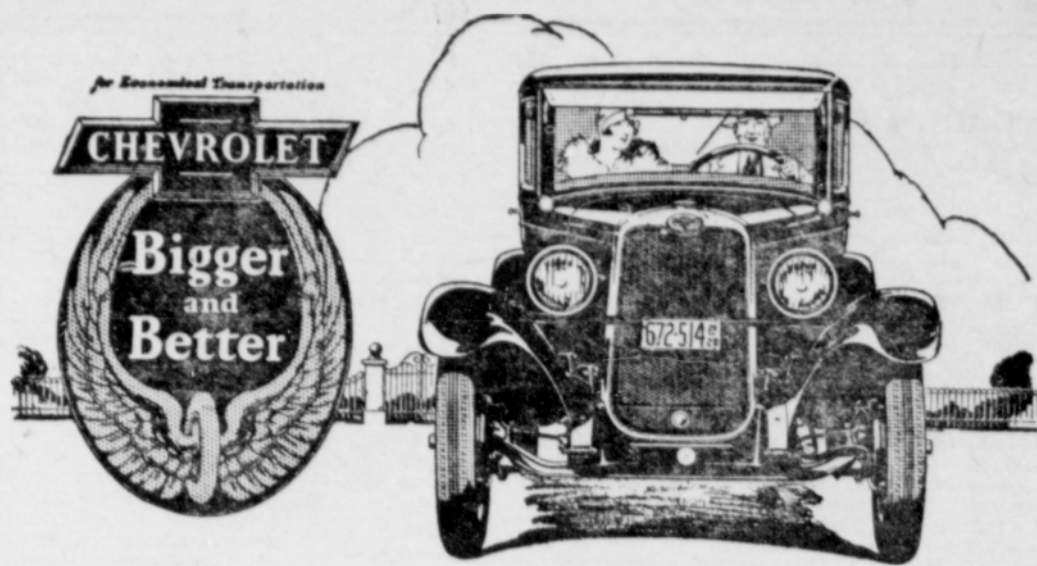
**POWELL VALLEY**
