Board Is Working on Plans for Fair

At last night's fair board meeting it was announced that at a recent meeting of the executive and finance committee, on resignation of A. W. Metzger as secretary, O. A. Eastman had been appointed secretary with Mrs. Eastman as assistant. Mrs. Eastman, who has had large experience in connection with the fair office, will devote her time to the clerical work of the office. She is soliciting ads for the 1928 premium list which it is hoped to issue early in May.

The board has tentatively decided on the first week in August as the date of this year's fair. The exact date will be announced soon. Robert R. Keyes, promoter of Whippet races and trainer of racing dogs, presented to the board a proposition to use the grandstand and portion of the track for a series of Whippet races starting some date this month and staging them at intervals of every two or three weeks during the summer. These are said to be very popular and will draw large crowds. The details of arrangements with Mr. Keyes were referred to Messrs. Raker and Hall with power to act.

County Club Agent W. H. Baillie, in charge of boys' and girls' club work, was elected a member of the fair board. He has had wide experience and will be a live member as well as a capable director of his department.

A committee, of which S. B. Hall is chairman, is working on plans for the new buildings to be erected on the grounds this spring and summer. It is planned to greatly enlarge the stock showing facilities and erect a substantial building for general exhibit purposes. Plans will be submitted to the county commissioners for their approval and the work started early.

So much was done last year in rearranging the track and grounds that very little extra expense will be incurred this year. But in order to curtail expenses and put the fair on a better footing financially the board is asking for practically all voluntary help and a new community spirit of cooperation. With the recently adopted plan of free admission it is believed the public will respond with a new interest and heartier support of all that is necessary to make the fair a success. The fair will not be cheapened, it is assured, but excessive expenses will be reduced and its permanence and growth made more certain.

March 11, Gresham Day at Mt. Hood

Gresham Legion Post Will Have New Home

Gresham Post No. 30, American Legion has taken a 30-day option on the property owned by Mrs. Hattie Reynolds, on East Powell street. At the regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, at the grange hall it was voted to purchase the property and cash and pledges totaling over \$600 were received. It is expected that by the time the option expires the rest of the money for the down payment will have been secured. Although only \$700 is needed the officers and members of the post are very anxious to make as large a payment as possible in order to save interest. Non-interest bearing notes are being issued to all who assist in the purchase.

The property consists of two 50 x 100-foot lots and a 26 x 40-foot plastered building which was erected a few years ago for use as a church by the Gresham Bible Standard congregation.

The option was taken for the Legion by the post executive committee. The Legion post feels that a vote of thanks is due Karl J. Haggberg who is representing Mrs. Reynolds for his assistance. The purchase price is \$1500.

The new building will be opened in April with a big initiation and ceremonial when it is expected at least 25 new members will be initiated in the principles of the American Legion. An effort will be made to secure the attendance of some of the state officers.

The meeting Tuesday night was very well attended and all were in favor of securing the building.

The report on the card party, held in Walter W. Metzger's garage showed there were 160 paid admissions. This was very gratifying. Another similar party is being planned for Wednesday night, March 21, at the same place.

The report of the membership committee showed 81 paid up members with several applications to be voted on. This is the largest membership Gresham Post has ever had. More ex-service men are beginning to see the Legion in its true light. Most ex-service men thought when they were discharged from the army or navy they were all through with their service connection. After ten years they find there are thousands of their buddies who will never be able to get out of the hospital to help them fight the cause of the ex-service man. For them, the able-bodied must carry on.

John W. Ratke, Washington state Legion commander, said at the American Legion convention at LaGrand, Oregon, last summer, that any man who is able to work is capable of caring for himself. Perhaps you don't owe yourself anything but get in and help those who can't work for themselves, said he.

The veterans hospital was reported filled to capacity and only emergency cases will be treated but applications will be taken and filled as others are discharged.

Poppies made by disabled veterans will be on sale again this year. People are urged not to buy imitations that will be on sale, but to make sure they get the genuine.

The next regular meeting of the legion and auxiliary will be held Tuesday night, March 27, in the grange hall, commencing with a pot-luck supper at 7, and followed by the business sessions of both organizations. The officers of both ask all who possibly can come to be there. The monthly meetings are social affairs which no ex-service man or his family can afford to miss.

LIME ROCK ORDERS POOLED FOR DELIVERY

Information coming from the state lime plant is to the effect that they have a good supply of rock on hand at the penitentiary at Salem which can be ground for rather prompt delivery on orders of lime rock.

There has been a number of inquiries at the county agent's office for small quantities of lime. Several farmers in this community indicated that they would use part of it. The county agent is making an attempt to pool the orders for those who are interested so the cars of lime rock may be shipped in to the nearest point of convenience to those interested in securing lime.

Lime is necessary in this section for the successful growth of alfalfa and will assist in the general soil building of many of the acid soils.

Those who are interested in securing lime this spring should communicate with the county agent's office at once in order to get in on the pool. S. B. Hall will also be glad to quote prices on the rock to those interested.
