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A. A. BAILEY WANTS COUNTY CLERK JOB

Under the banner: "For Multnomah county, its people and their welfare" A. A. Bailey, chief clerk of the probate court fired the opening campaign gun in the spring primaries by being first to file a declaration that he would be a candidate for public office. He is seeking the republican nomination for county clerk, to succeed Joseph W. Beveridge whose term of office expires at the end of this year.

During his 32 years residence in Portland, Bailey has acquired a background of civic, social and political service that fully qualifies him for the office he seeks. He has served two terms in the lower house of the Oregon legislature; and one term in the senate. In 1917 he became chief officer of the juvenile court and in 1918 chief clerk of the probate court, which office he still holds.

"In my platform" Bailey said in discussing his candidacy, "I will pledge myself to a definite reduction in administrative expense of the county clerk's office."

"I will point out specific instances where material economies may be effected without any sacrifice of efficiency."

"I will also point out specific instances wherein the office can be brought up to a higher standard of efficiency."

Bailey's opponent for the office will be incumbent, Joseph W. Beveridge who has occupied it continuously since January, 1917. When his term expires the first of next year he will have held the position for a period of 12 years.

The Co-op Finds Its Place

Cooperative marketing, generally, is getting on a better business basis. In the opinion of Chris L. Christensen, who is in charge of the division of cooperative marketing in the United States Department of Agriculture, farmers are gaining a clearer understanding, he thinks, of the aims and purposes of cooperative marketing and what may be expected in the way of practical results. They are beginning to realize for example that there is no simple exact form of organization that can be rated as "best." A cut-and-dried formula does not insure success. The organization must be adapted to local economic and social conditions. The important things to study are the kinds of work the cooperative can do and the services it can render. Farmers are getting away from the idea that merely by organizing they can fix prices for their products or achieve an immediate alteration in marketing conditions. They are getting down to the bed rock of sound financing, better grading and packing methods, efficient management and skillful merchandising.

The Oregon division of the American Association of University Women, at the annual meeting held in Portland, Saturday afternoon, February 11, decided to offer a fellowship of \$1200 to a woman resident of Oregon who holds at least a bachelor of arts degree from a standard college and his definite plans of research in any field of study. This is the first time that the association has offered a graduate fellowship and the announcement is expected to arouse considerable interest among the college women of the state.
