KOZER NOT ELIGIBLE

In the primary nominating election on May 18th there will be one familiar name absent from the list of candidates for secretary of state, Sam A. Kozar, who has been connected with the state house for a great many years, and who has twice served as secretary of state, is prohibited by law from again being a candidate. The Oregon law provides that the secretary of state, the treasurer and the governor shall not serve more than eight years out of 12, or more than two consecutive terms. Thus it develops that Sam Kozar cannot run for re-election this year.

Hal Hoss, who has just resigned as secretary to the governor to enter the race for the nomination to succeed Mr. Kozar, continues to lead the field, and is generally conceded to be the favored candidate.

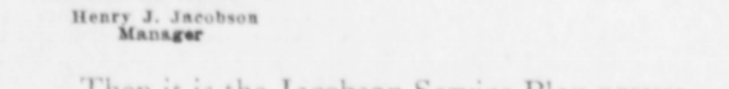
