Bids on Sinking Well Ordered by Council

Steps were taken by the city council at its meeting on Wednesday evening looking toward the installation of a private water system for the municipality, when the water committee was ordered to call for bids on a 10-inch well to be sunk to a depth of not more than 300 feet, on the city's property adjacent to the water tank.

On the invitation of the council, A. L. Ziesing, who drilled the Rockwood and Fairview wells, and A. M. Jansen, a well known well driller both here and in Washington, were present and discussed the possibility of putting down a well for Gresham, with estimates of possible cost. These men know the conditions here and believe that an adequate sheet of water will be struck between 160 and 200 feet.

Guy L. LaFollette of the Universal Mortgage corporation, the mortgage department of the Brotherhood National Bank association, submitted figures for a sinking fund to retire the \$20,000 bonds voted two years ago to cover the cost of the water tank. No definite action was taken at this time, it seeming advisable to await the outcome of the well project.

A heated discussion, pro and con, took place over the proposed leasing of the city building to Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Phillips for a sandwich stand. The objections appeared to center around the incongruity of conducting a public eating place in such close proximity to the comfort station, and the criticism that this would bring on the city. The upshot of the matter was that the \$25 which Mr. Phillips paid down for the first month's rent be returned to him and that he be notified to vacate the building. It is understood that Mr. Phillips has his equipment installed and gas connections made.

Recorder Schneider reported that Mr. Phillips approached him three or four weeks ago with the proposition that he would take a five-year lease at \$25 a month. Mr. Schneider referred the man to the committee on public property and as a result Phillips returned with the verbal approval of the members of the committee, and paid the first month's rent. Receipt was given him with the statement that the leasing was contingent on the action of the council. On the supposition that the action would be favorable to him, Phillips proceeded to prepare for the opening of his sandwich shop, which he advertised for March 10.

A proposition which was not accepted by the council was made by Dan Murphy, who asked that the 25-foot alley between the Linne-mann and Michel properties on Powell street be widened to 30 feet and accepted as a street.

Street lights were requested for the Section Line road opposite the new residence of A. McManus, and on Main street near the city limits. The street committee took the matter under advisement.

The council instructed the recorder to take up with the Oregon Humane society the matter of taking up dogs found running at large and caring for them.

GRESHAM FOLK SHAKEN IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Several Gresham people were involved in an automobile accident Friday evening in Portland which might easily have terminated unfortunately for all concerned, when Mr. and Mrs. George F. Honey, Mrs. Honey's sister Mrs. Alice Robinson and Mrs. Frank Peak, driving south on 37th street, were struck by a light car driven by DeVillie H. Bundy, who was proceeding west on Lincoln.

The occupants of the Honey auto were not injured to any great extent, although all were badly shaken up and one lady of the party sustained a slight bruise as she was thrown heavily forward by the impact. The driver who struck them was said to be driving at terrific speed and it seemed a miracle that he was not killed. His car skidded across the street, after striking the Honey auto on the left side over the front wheel, and turned upside down, pinning the driver beneath. He was found to be badly bruised when taken out and was bedfast for several days, but is thought to be not seriously injured.

Mr. Honey's automobile was damaged to the extent of a bent frame and was towed away immediately to a repair shop. The other car, however, was practically demolished. Accident insurance carried by the drivers will take care of the damage to both cars. Mr. Honey had clearly the right of way and the young man's carelessness in driving at excessive speed is said to be responsible alone for the accident.

OIL COMPANY FINDS NEW LOCATION

Following a remonstrance, signed by more than 60 Gresham citizens opposed to the location of the Shell Oil company tanks on property adjacent to a residential section of Gresham and Gresham Union high school, nothing definite has been learned of the intentions of the oil company.

It would now appear, however, from considerable activity going on at Ruby Junction that the oil company has finally secured a favorable site for the tanks. Apparently preparations are going forward for the erection of the plant at that place.

A construction house has been put up on the Farrand property at Ruby and an oil tank has been unloaded there.

The county grade school teachers, from the fourth to the eighth grades inclusive, will meet in one of the courtrooms of the county courthouse in Portland on Saturday, March 10, at 10 o'clock. Many Women Enjoy Gas Cooking School

Yesterday was the final class in the series of cooking classes sponsored by the Gresham Outlook and given by Mrs. Rose Bartlett, expert cook, representing the Portland Gas and Coke company, at the Methodist Episcopal church. This last day of the class was given over to the making of an oven dinner, with a short time devoted to oven canning, the modern method of canning.

Mrs. Bartlett's demonstrations have been greatly appreciated by the women attending the classes and many of the housewives have reported to the Outlook that they have successfully made the dishes for which the expert gave the recipes. The actual making of the dishes with every movement explained has made it easy for them to produce excellent results, they say. Not a few of those reporting on their attendance at the classes have said that one of the most interesting things was the acquaintance with Mrs. Bartlett, a woman of charming personality as well as expert knowledge of cookery and the manner of using the smoothtop gas range.

On the raised platform at the church were placed two of these modern ranges for Mrs. Bartlett's convenience, and she kept them both busy cooking the delicious foods she prepared. Her interesting instructions about food and the way to make it most palatable and beneficial were thrown in as she rapidly stirred and mixed together just such ingredients as any housewife has at her disposal, and displayed and served the tasty finished preparations.

A printed leaflet containing all the recipes used on the platform as well as the recipes used in making some tempting foods served to the women were given to all attending and did away with the necessity of each woman's writing down the directions. A supply of these leaflets has been left at the Outlook office and can be had without cost by anyone asking for them.

In spite of inclement weather on some of the class days, the attendance was the best of any course here and the series of classes were greatly enjoyed by the housewives. This is the fourth year that such a series has been sponsored by the Outlook with satisfactory results. The attendance on that last day, not counting the children, was 164. The attendance for the other days was 106, 115 and 133, respectively, showing a steady gain in interest.

More than 20 door prizes were given out on the closing day of the school, ranging from a 50-pound sack of flour to small bottles of extract. It is interesting to note that those receiving the gifts were widely separated, coming from Portland, Troutdale, Gresham, and on the rural routes from Gresham as far as Rockwood, Linnemann and Pleasant Home.

Local Merchants Aid Milwaukee.

Leslie Walrad and E. W. Aylsworth went to Milwaukee last night, where they helped to organize a credit association among the merchants of that place and nearby trading centers. Out of a possible 40 mercantile concerns, 22 were represented at the meeting. Walrad told of the conditions which caused Gresham merchants to organize a credit bureau, conditions which the Milwaukee men said were duplicated in that community. Walrad is vice president of the Gresham organization and Aylsworth is a director.
