"FOUR SQUARE" FAIRNESS.

Under the above heading the Benton Independent, published at Corvallis, calls attention to some unfair practices of authorities and students at the state college. Here are a few paragraphs:

"The barbers are not alone in a complaint against the new student memorial plans which include a barber shop, beauty parlor, cafeteria and other commercial enterprises. Many business men of the city, and elsewhere, contributed to the memorial building, but not to a business in competition with their own."

"We should be surprised if we knew how many regular accounts from Corvallis there are in the big and little stores of Portland."

"The city supports the college in full and has the right to expect an equivalent in loyalty. Many of the students buy in their own home town, and rightfully. Many things cannot be bought in a city of the size of Corvallis. Many more things could be bought here at just as good an advantage, if folk only would honestly try."

Corvallis isn't the only city where there is reason to complain of this practice. The business firms in our high school towns are called upon to contribute to and help in various ways in high school activities throughout the school year.

They pay heavily in school taxes and are appealed to to support bond issues and improvement programs. And this they invariably do quite loyally. But when they are passed up by those directing student activities when there are purchases to be made and the money is spent outside the district there arises a feeling of unfair discrimination and lack of loyalty to those on whom the burden of school support depends and this condition will inevitably react against the school.
