**Sandy War Veteran Succumbs to Illness**

Alex. Gray, aged 35 years, late of Sandy, Oregon, died on Wednesday, March 7, and was buried Saturday in Sandy cemetery, following funeral services in St. Michael's church where requiem high mass was celebrated. The deceased is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mildred Gray, his parents Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Gray, two brothers Raymond and Ted, and a sister Mrs. Isabell Wolf, all of Sandy.

Mr. Gray's death took place at the United States veterans' hospital at Walla Walla, Washington, from tuberculosis, from which he had been a sufferer for four months past. He was an overseas man, having entered the service in 1918. On his arrival in France he was put at the front and was in the Meuse-Argonne offensive. After this battle he was reported missing but was later found to have been gassed and was in a base hospital. He returned home shortly after the signing of the armistice. He was married last May to Miss Mildred Bosholt of Sandy.

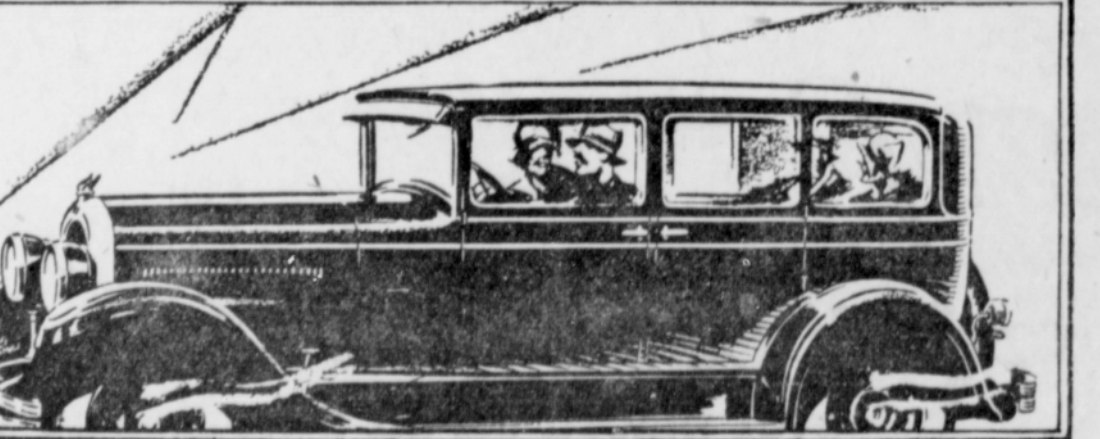
