

### Last Tribute Paid to Well Loved Friend

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Rockwood Methodist Episcopal church for Mrs. Frank Dickenson, who passed away March 11.

It was impossible to seat the large number of people who came to the church for the last sad rites. Rev. Oswald Taylor of the Episcopal church spoke very touchingly of the beautiful life of Mrs. Dickenson and offered words of consolation to the bereft.

Mrs. Myrtle Smith sang, "Beulah Land," and "It Is Well With My Soul," with Mrs. J. F. Dunlop at the piano.

The rostrum, which extends nearly the width of the church, was nearly hidden from view by floral offerings, the gifts of sympathetic friends and relatives.

The pall bearers were Miles Grimshaw, Richard Tegart, Wm. Stanley, John Burns, A. G. Schantlin and Walker Quesinberry. Minerva Isabella Hartley was born June 19, 1862, two miles east of Gresham and died March 11, 1928.

When a child her parents moved to the Hartley donation land claim at Rockwood until her marriage to Frank Dickenson on August 24, 1881, and has resided in this community all her life, being known to all of her friends both old and young as Aunt Belle.

She was a member of the Episcopal church and an active and charter member of the Woman's Benefit association. She was a kind, devoted wife and loving mother.

She leaves to mourn her death her widower, Frank Dickenson; three children, Mrs. Martha Cook, Mrs. Margaret Harvey and Edward Dickenson; also five grandchildren Harold, Francis and Eva Cook, Burton and Alfred Harvey, and two sisters, Mrs. Margie Sales, Route 2, Gresham, and Mrs. Eliza Sales, Everett, Washington, and one brother, George Etna Hartley, South Bellingham, Washington, besides a host of friends.

Burial was made at the Douglas cemetery where the members of the Woman's Benefit association had charge.
