#### Saron Lutheran to Observe Anniversary

The 30th anniversary of the founding of the Saron Lutheran church will be observed with special services on Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. Festival services in English will be held Tuesday evening.

Three pastors will participate in the various services, the principal sermon at the opening to be delivered by the Rev. C. G. Blomquist of Portland, assisted by the Rev. H. P. Johnson of Portland and the Rev. Erick Wahlstrom of Warren, Oregon.

A mixed quartet will sing the anthems, "Behold the Lamb of God," and "Surely He Hath Borne Our Grief" from Handel's Messiah, while a solo from the same oratorio, "He Was Despised" will be rendered by Miss Doris Renhard of Portland.

On Wednesday morning, March 23, communion services will be observed in Swedish at 10:30, and at that time the Rev. B. S. Nystrom of Portland will deliver an address. That afternoon at 2:30 there will be a Lenten service in Swedish, the Rev. Mr. Wahlstrom to speak.

The final anniversary program will take place Wednesday evening when the Rev. H. P. Johnson will deliver a festival address. A former pastor, the Rev. A. M. Green will speak along a historical line that evening. Special music will be given by the choir and a male quartet, also a solo by Jack Wallin. During the evening a special offering will be taken for the building fund.

The Ladies Aid met at the home of Mrs. Charles Dahlquist recently, at which time a pleasing program was arranged. Several members

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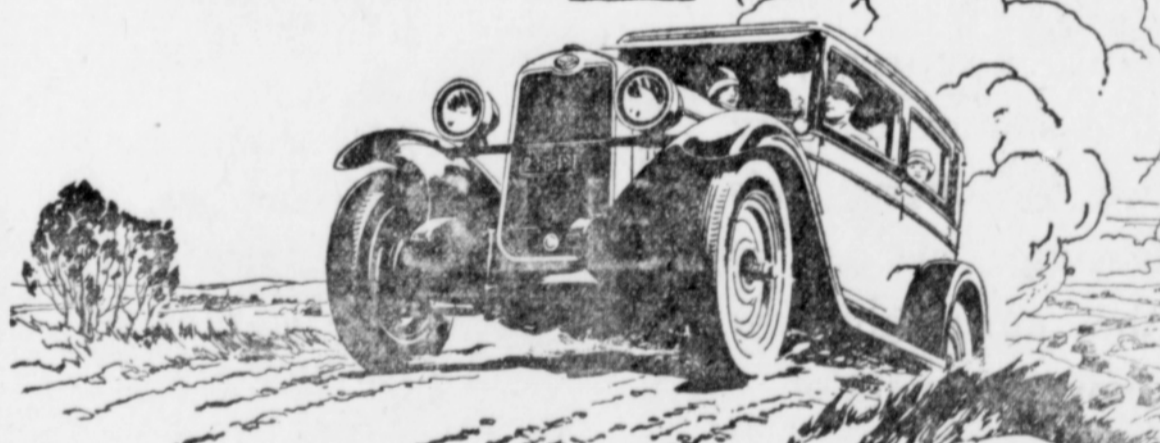

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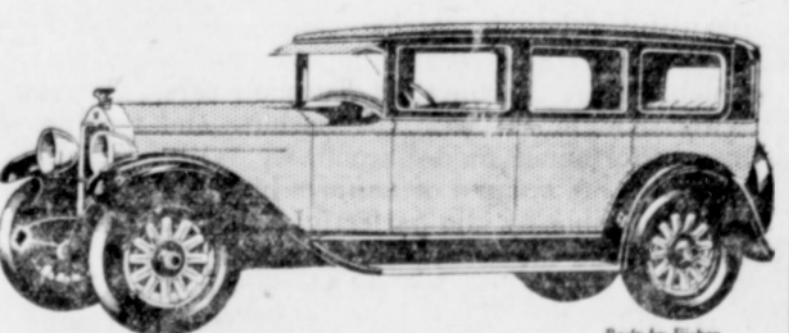
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
