Of this amount the report shows the wheat farmer received 1.15 cents, the miller 0.41 cents, the baker 5.11 cents, the grocer 1.28 cents, railroads, etc., 0.60 cents.

LIGHTING OF HIGHWAYS WOULD INCREASE USE

Two per cent of a state highway investment if spent for adequate illumination would double the night use of roads and largely increase the usefulness of highway systems, according to an article in the Transactions of the Illuminating Engineering Society.

"Two knotty traffic problems which become more insistent every year are highway congestion by day, and glare by night. Adequate highway lighting would be at once the practical and economical solution of both.

"Let us consider this from an economic standpoint. The automobile investment of the United States for 1926 is estimated at ten billion dollars. It costs 20 to 50 thousand dollars to build a mile of highway. To light it costs about \$700 a year.

"On a basis of 35 thousand dollars a mile cost, for two per cent of the state highway investment, spent in adequate highway lighting, it is conservative to estimate that the night use of roads would be doubled. Night traffic is now 18 per cent of the total, and doubling this would increase the present efficiency of the highway system by at least that percentage."

ANSWERS

1. More than half the rubbers used in the United States are made in Massachusetts and Connecticut, the annual production of their factories amounting in value to \$75,000,000.

2. Argentina is the greatest producer of flaxseed in the world, the crop of 1927 being about 50,000,000 bushels. The states of North and South Dakota, Minnesota and Montana produced last year 25,000,000 bushels worth about \$2 a bushel. These states are the second largest source of flax seed in the world.

3. Many European airplane lines provide sleeping accommodations. One German double-decked super-airplane has been developed which provides 20 sleeping compartments.

4. Last year Canada raised 44,000,000 pounds of tobacco from 44,000 acres of crop.

5. Last year's crop of oranges, lemons and grape fruit in California amounted to 70,000 carloads, returning to the growers about \$120,000,000. Of California citrus fruit the United States eats annually to the value of \$2.15 per capita.

6. Glass is made of pure sand melted at a very high temperature, with soda to aid the melting. The raw material from which it is made is so plentiful that it does not pay to remelt old glass.

7. Charles Joseph Bonaparte, of Baltimore, grandson of Jerome Bonaparte who was brother of the Emperor of France, was secretary of the navy and afterward attorney general in the cabinet of President Roosevelt.

8. Alexander Hamilton, secretary of the treasury under Washington, and Commodore Steven Decatur, both highly esteemed American citizens, were killed in duels.
