Mr. and Mrs. H. Bates have moved to Springdale to their farm which they have leased out for several years.

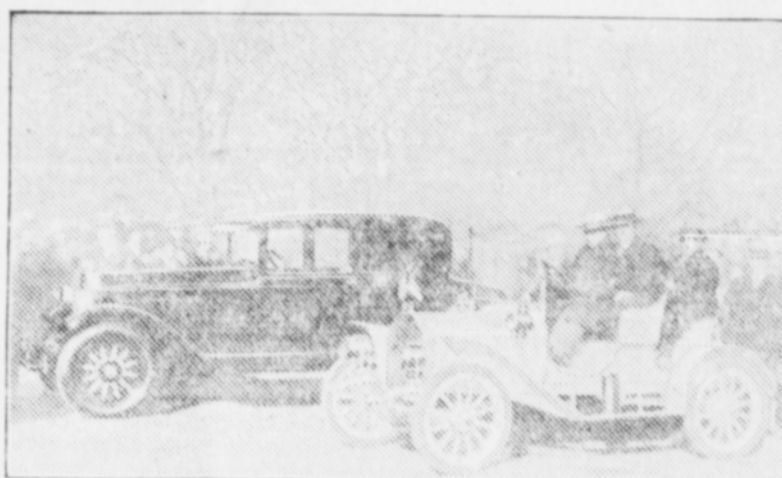
