SHOULD BE RE-ELECTED.

Franklin F. Korell, republican, representative in congress from district No. 3, Multnomah county, is up for nomination in May primary. He was elected to fill the late Crumpacker's unexpired term. He is a young man, born in Portland in 1889, a lawyer and orator of great energy and marked capability. Multnomah county may well be proud of his record during the short time he has served in the 70th congress and should nominate and re-elect him this year. He is the right man for the place, has many years of usefulness and should be given unanimous support.

20 YEARS IN CONGRESS.

Willis C. Hawley, of Salem, may be considered "the grand old man of Oregon in congress," having been continuously in congress for 20 years without a break. He is still in his prime, being 64 years old, a native Oregonian, an educator and lawyer of marked ability. He is representative from district No. 1 and is up for re-election on the republican ticket. He recently became chairman of the powerful ways and means committee of the house. His nomination and election should be unanimous.

CHAUNCY M. DEPEW.

The passing of Chauncy M. Dewey removes a statesman, orator and philosopher of the first water, a well known and influential man. He was nearly 93 years old, was born in Peekskill, N. Y., where he is laid to rest after a long and useful life. He wanted to live to be a centenarian.

Among his many sayings are the following which are well worth pondering: "I think that my age is due to the fact that I have been on good terms with humankind. I have made strenuous efforts to be calm, to be tranquil. I have cultivated people all my life because I liked them."

"This is a mighty good world to live in—and I want to stay here as long as I can."

AVIATION FIELD NEEDED.

Aviation is fast becoming an established custom throughout the land and we may well begin to plan to adapt ourselves to it. During the past 25 or 30 years the country has adapted itself to the automobile as a means of travel and transportation. This change has been revolutionary and rapid. The development of aviation commercially promises to be more rapid even than auto transportation and it behooves us to anticipate the changes that are bound to come and plan to adapt ourselves to them. This applies to communities, business in general and individuals.

The need of a local municipal auto park, or camp ground, is not so urged as it seemed a few years ago, as this need has been so generally met, locally and nearby by private enterprise.

The need of a local landing field for airplanes is one that should be given earnest consideration. The commercial club should have a committee to make investigations as to needs and conditions and take early steps to provide a suitable landing field. The matter has already been discussed but it should be followed up with energy and purpose until results are obtained.

In a recent communication to the Outlook, E. B. McNaughton, recently elected vice president of the First National bank of Portland, says: "One of the most outstanding and rapidly advancing enterprises before us today is that of aviation, both as an industry and as a force which is going to exert a most pro-

found influence upon our future economic life. He says that many Oregon communities are planning airports which puts them in the far-seeing and progressive class; that cities and towns without aviation facilities will, in the next few years, be very much like a hamlet without a railroad station.

RECKLESS DRIVER ON TRIAL IN COURT

William Smith, driver of the automobile that struck and killed Mrs. Anastasia Sulewski, 40, and her seven-year-old daughter, Mary, on the morning of August 3, 1927, was placed on jury trial today in Circuit Judge Evans' court on a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

Mrs. Sulewski and her daughter were killed on the Base Line road as they were on their way to the berry fields near their home. Smith was returning from Bonneville where he had been delivering supplies for a picnic. The indictment charged him with reckless driving.

Growing Flax for Oil Seed.

The American Linseed Co. of California, which has a mill in operation in Portland, has made a suggestion to Willamette valley farmers to grow seed flax as a profitable crop. This mill, which has been in existence the past 40 years, can handle the product of 50,000 acres annually, most of the supply of seed for its purposes being now obtained from the middle west, from Argentine, China and other foreign lands. The company will be glad to give full information on the subject.
