**Services Planned
for Pleasant Home**

Interesting services for Easter are being planned for the Pleasant Home churches, both of which have arranged special programs.

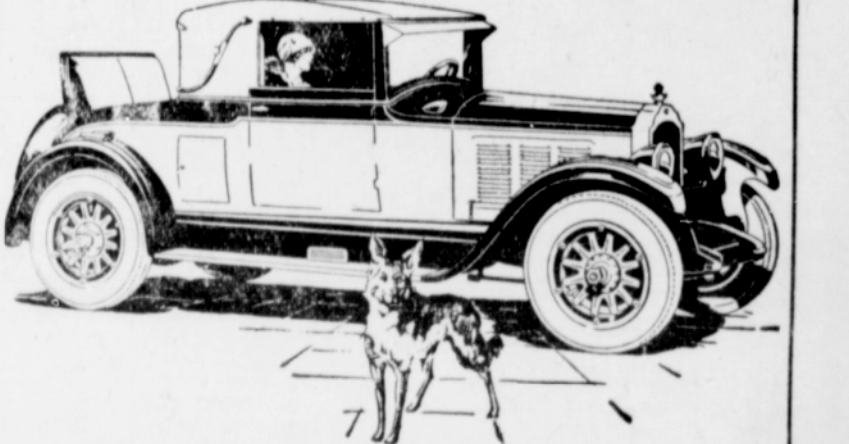
