VOTING SCHOOL BONDS.

This afternoon the question of issuing \$37,500 school bonds for Union high district No. 2 for improvements and enlargement will be decided by the voters.

It is regretful that some personalities have been injected into the campaign and it is provable that misstatements have been circulated tending to cloud the real issues and throw discredit on the board and others deeply interested.

One thing is very apparent, in the main the younger generation of persons, including parents and those looking forward hopefully and bravely to the good of their families and community are favorable to the proposed enlargement plan, while the opposition is made up generally of the older people, some living on the interest of larger or smaller savings of the past.

How hard it is for the mind of the one past 50 or 60 to think in terms of the present. They naturally revert to the past and are too often "out of step" with the younger generation of those who are anxious to advance and give their children the best to be had.

While the people of eastern Multnomah did not have an opportunity to vote on the proposed merger of the two electric companies defeated last Monday in Portland—all were interested and we think the rural population would have favored it.

It is useless now to comment on its advantages. We believe it would have been a good thing. It may be the P. E. P. company will gradually absorb the Northwestern if the latter desire to go out of business but that will doubtless be without a pledge or prospect of reduced rates—if it happens.
