**HALEY**

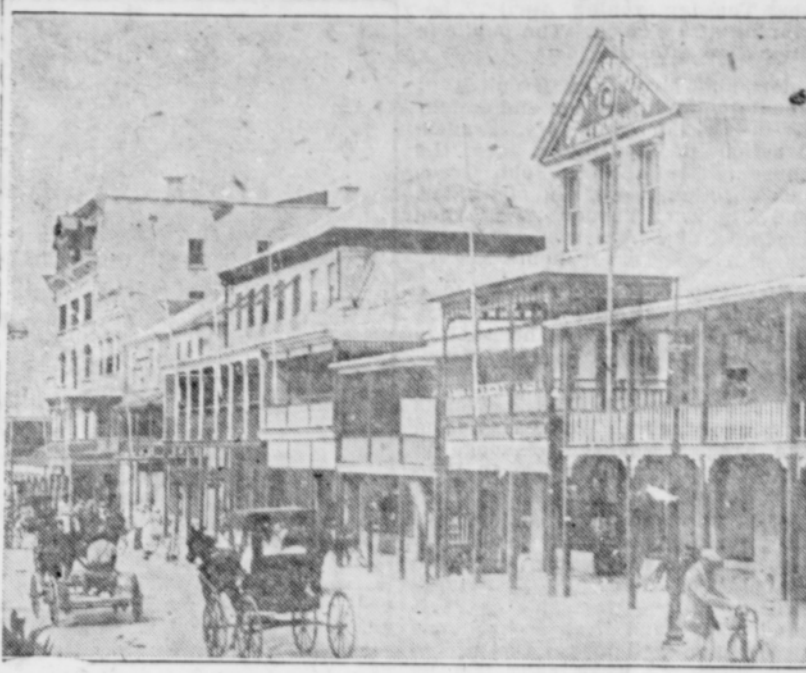
