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SELECTING CANDIDATES.

The primary election, for the party nominations, on May 18, is now only a month away. Today is the last day for candidates to file for office so that it will now be known who are "in the race" and voters may study the qualifications of candidates, make comparisons and prepare to make their selections at the polls.

One of the privileges of American citizenship is the exercise of the franchise. In Oregon the primary nominating election is very important because the nomination in many cases means election. This is especially true as to state and county officers and members of the state senate and legislature.

The first hint of the Outlook is to give its readers such general information regarding candidates as it can gather and find space to use. Usually the candidates furnish this information, and help the editor to that extent, and the paper tries to give all an equal opportunity. Naturally the editor has a better acquaintance and forms a closer contact with some than with others.

The Outlook may have, should have, its preferences and will endeavor to fairly express them but it believes every candidate should have a chance to reasonably express his claims and hopes.

BIRDMEN CROSS ATLANTIC.

The latest attempt to fly a plane through the opposing air currents of the north Atlantic was partly successful. The Bremen with three aviators made a non-stop flight from Ireland to Newfoundland Thursday and Friday last week. Their goal was New York city but they were driven out of their course and forced to land on a small, rocky island with same damage to their plane.

Several successful flights eastward have been made but this is the first non-stop flight westward to link the two continents. Several attempts have been disastrous.

It is believed from the experiences of this latest flight discoveries of conditions will be made which may account for the past failures and perhaps help to prevent future disastrous attempts. The solo flight of Lindbergh is not likely to be equaled for a long time.

A TRIBUTE TO THE GRANGE.

In a recent address Senator William E. Borah of Idaho paid high tribute to the grange organization and to the progressive leadership it is giving the farmers of the United States towards improving their conditions. Senator Borah and Senator Arthur Capper of Kansas were numbered in the class of 5811 candidates who took the seventh degree of that organization when the national grange met at Cleveland, Ohio, last November, and both have since on more than one occasion been very outspoken in expressing their admiration for this farmers' fraternity, as now seen by them from the inside.

Shortened Schedules by S. P.

Changes in running time of Southern Pacific trains, effective May 6, will bring San Francisco and Portland one hour nearer to each other, according to John M. Scott, of Portland, assistant passenger traffic manager. The deluxe Cascade is placed on a 22-hour schedule, making a total reduction of five hours in the travel time between the two cities in two years. "Those are the fastest regular schedules ever operated between the northwest and California," Scott said. "The Cascade becomes a 22-hour train between the two cities, affording service without a cascade in speed, safety and comfort, and recalling the days of '72 when 79 hours between the two cities was thought a miracle of speed."

Dandelion Greens Cheap and Timely.

Dandelion greens can be gathered very early in the season, when they are young, tender, and least bitter. Owing to this bitterness of flavor, it is a good plan to combine the dandelion greens with other vegetables or flavors which modify it. The plan of cooking these greens in several waters is not recommended because much of the valuable mineral matter is thrown away, vitamins are destroyed, and the greens are overcooked. Raw dandelion leaves or those cooked without water are less bitter than those that have been boiled.

The respective values of the seed and stem ends of seed potatoes have long been a matter of controversy among potato growers. A study by the U. S. department of agriculture, based both on practical experiments and on literature on the subject, indicates that there is little, if any difference in the value of the two sets for seed purposes.

Too Many Potatoes Maybe.

The U. S. department of agriculture advises growers of late potatoes to watch the reports regarding increased plantings, which are now forecasted in some sections of the country, and to govern their own acreage accordingly. It is recognized that if the acreage of commercial potatoes is much increased the market price will be affected in proportion, and already there is indicated an increase of 14 per cent in the North Atlantic and north states. The government advice closes as follows: "Unless there is a more general realization of what this means, there is likely to be a difficult marketing situation in these states next fall."

If a field of alfalfa winterkills or is flooded to a damaging degree his spring it is still possible in most districts to harvest a crop of excellent legume hay in time for winter feeding. In those regions where the season is not too short soy beans offer one of the best prospects for harvesting a high protein crop the year 'round. This applies particularly to regions where alfalfa does well ordinarily but fails occasionally. In regions where alfalfa does not do well, soy beans have proved a popular substitute.

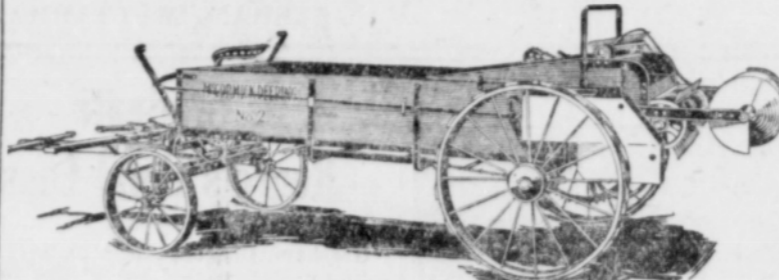
