Springdale Men Have Fire-Fighting Unit

The reorganization of the fire-fighting unit, which functioned with good success last summer in the vicinity of Springdale, was effected on Monday night at a meeting at the schoolhouse under the direction of E. W. Wheeler, district forest ranger at the Hermon Creek station near Cascade Locks. Thomas Northway was elected fire chief of the district to succeed J. Ward Evans. Albert Welsendanger, forest ranger in charge of the Eagle Creek camp ground, and W. H. Northway, supervisor of trail building, were present and took part in the discussions. This unit is outside the national forest and adjacent to it and is for public protection.

A truck and fire-fighting tools are available at all times and it will be the effort of the men of the unit to extinguish small fires in the forest without calling for help from a distance. Whenever called upon by the chief for service the men will be paid for their work, as will others outside the unit who may be called upon to fight fires.
