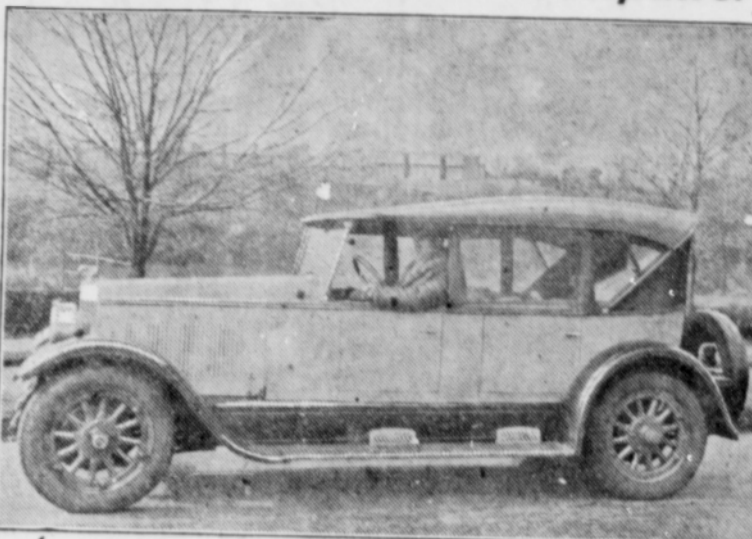
Mrs. Rena Robinson of McMinnville is visiting her daughter, Mrs. W. E. Tegart.
